Junior "A" Hockey League Probable Replacement For Struggling Seniors

Whether the Okanagan Junior Amateur Hockey League will replace its senior counterpart depends on its acceptance by Vernon's long-suffering Joe Phan, and a continuance of the uncertainty which surrounds the struggling OSAHL.

While the seniors have yet to call a meeting to discuss their future, junior backers have stepped in with a rapid promotion plan which has almost reached its completion.

The OJAHL has released a tentative schedule which is slated to open at the Civic Arena October 31 between Vernon and Kelowna. Featuring teams from Kamloops, Vernon, Kelowna and Penticton, the junior season will last until February 10, with 15 home and 15 away games.

This will be followed by the league playoffs, and then provincial playoffs against the Kootenay and coast champions to determine the province's representative in Memorial Cup competition.

LOOKING FOR SPONSORS

Right now the clubs are negotiating for sponsors. Already Kamloops has acquired the backing of a major hotel, and others are likely to follow between now and the opening of training camps October 1.

Apart from these individual sponsorships the league will receive no outside financial help. "We are hoping that fan response will make it self-supporting organization," says league president Bill, Brown.

The Okanagan junior setup will have no hookup with professional leagues. "Right now that's the way we want it to be," states president Brown, who expects Western Hockey League clubs to apply for junior league seasoning for their top prospects despite this rule.

Steps have been taken to combat this invasion. "Now they're allowed only one import from one club," says Bill. "We'll probably lose some of our best boys but most of them already had strings with prairie clubs before we thought of forming a junior league here," he states.


Vernon's junior prospects look healthy. Most of last season's better players will be back in the lineup, and with a little junior experience behind them should provide the nucleus for a contending club.
