Mr. Oswell gave the first half of the afternoon session to the "Theory of Judging Figures and Free Skating Programs." The audience was told of the growth and development of skating and its rules during the past 30

The last half of the afternoon session was devoted to figure and free skating ice demonstrations. A discussion of the marking was held after each figure was completed.


Miss Jo Watson, bronze medallist and winner of the Juvenile Ladies Eliminations last year, illustrated several figures.
