## Infant OJAHL Has Stormy Start Ski Club Here

#### Penticton Protest Thrown Out, Kelowna And Kamloops Fined

Okanagan Junior A Hockey League, although producing some fine and exciting hockey, has already left a stormy imprint in the minds of valley hockey fans.

Protests, suspensions and free-for-alls are old hat to the young league.

#### PROTEST LODGED

Latest problem encountered by league president Bill Brown is a protest lodged by the Penticton Junior Vees over a game played in Vernon December 5.

Vernon Junior Canadians gained a 5-3 victory over the Vees and their only win of the season.

Penticton lodged the protest contesting a call early in the third period which sent Penticton defender Lanny Nevison off the ice with two minutes for abusive language.

Vees contended that the penalty should have been a 10minute misconduct that would not have left the Vees a man short and therefore not as vulnerable to the Vernon attack.

However, Brown stated today that "a referee's decision must be upheld by the OJAHL executive."

#### THROWN OUT

In throwing out the protest, Brown pointed out that there is no rule against a two-minute penalty for abusive language.

Brown said that while a misconduct "shall" or can be handed out, "the rule book does not say a player must receive a

"Persons concerned with hockey must remember the rule book is there for guidance of the referees," said Brown.

The league president also let it be known today that he is fining the Kamloops Rockets and the Kelowna Buckaroos \$25 each as a result of the donnybrook that erupted during a game in Kamloops December 6.

"I'm taking this action instead of fining or suspending players involved," said Brown, "because I feel the coaches were partly to blame and it would be more detrimental to the league to nail the players directly."

On another front, the executive of the British Columbia Amateur Hockey Association is meeting in Penticton Saturday.

Highlight of the meeting is expected to be an appeal by Kelowna of the two-year suspension given Buckaroo Wayne Horning for attaking a referee.

#### IMPROVEMENT SEEN

Despite the above incidents, persons concerned with promotion and development of the infant league can be proud of their efforts to date and in fact can look forward with pleasure to the future if the rate of progress continues.

Each week sees a larger turnout of fans to witness steadily improving calibre of hockey and while not much was expected in its first trial year, the OJAHL has provided as much entertainment to some as a senior league in the Valley ever did.
