







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Rockets Show Why They Lead

Bad Night At Home For Canucks, But Alec McBride Takes A Deuce

VERNON 2, KAMLOOPS 7

A two-goal effort by Junior Canadian Al McBride was anything but enough Tuesday as the Canucks were defeated 7-2 by the league-leading Kamloops Rockets in Okanagan Junior A Hockey League action here.

McBride opened the scoring after 20 seconds of the first period bu tfrom then on, the powerful Kamloops club took possession, giving the Blues only occasional chances to redeem themselves in their 18th loss this season.

Noticeably absent in Vernon's loops, Donaldson (Patterson), attack was the solid competitive spirit common to the Canucks, win or lose, in previous games.

Odie Lowe's crew was playing a seemingly half-hearted, chippy style of hockey which had little effect on the hard-working Rockets. But even a last-place club is

entitled to an off night and for the most part, Canucks are continuing to show improvement and are still favored to knock over a few of their opponents before the league's completion. McBride's goal after the open-

Rockets lost no time in tieing the score. At 2:29, with Vernon defenceman Harry Wynnychuk off for tripping, Bill Donaldson culminated a Kamloops powerplay by poking it from a scramble past Vernon goalie Bob Jones. Four minutes later, the north-

erners tallied again when Bill Cochran sidestepped Wynnychuk, took a pass from Terry Shishido and skated in homefree on Jones. Leading point - getter Jackie

James scored at 5:22 of the second stanza taking his cue from Glen Richards to put Kamloops two up. Donaldson notched his second of the night at 9:56 with an assist from Brian Patterson. McBride blasted off early in

the final frame also, with a goal at the 14 second mark. Bob Stein engineered the play from the opening face-off. But Kamloops quickly explod-


