Junior Hockey Squad Shapes Up For Season

3 Defencemen, 3 Forwards New To Vernon Lineup

Vernon juniors' coach Bill Brown is gradually shaping a hockey team together from the crowd of try-outs turning out for twice weekly practices.

At the present time he has six defencemen, nine forwards and a goalie for his regular startling line-up.

There are a number of new faces included. On the forward line are "imports" Howie McNeil and Corky Agar, as well as Dave Groenhugsen.

For defence there are newcomers Ed Stein, Daryl Douglas from juveniles and Garth Gill, a try-out from last year.

McNeil, who hails from the Penticton Junior Vees should help the team considerably if he can apply his rushing tactics as a fullback to the game of hockey. Agar is from Los Angeles and is the son of George Agar, former playing coach with the defunct Senior 'A' Vernon Canadians.

Back for another season as defensive stalwarts are Gordy Nuyens, Dave MacKay and Gary Roland. Up front are Bobby Stein, Dale Sorochuk,

Jim Stephen, Buck Sherk, Ike Coulter and Gordy Kineshanko.

Back for the juniors as netminder is Larry Pinnak.

There are also a number of juveniles working out with the juniors. Some of these may stay on for the season, the others returning to the minor ranks for another year.

Coach Brown urges all juveniles presently attending junior practices to register this Saturday with the Juvenile Division so they will get some league play this season pending an opportunity to move up.

The juniors held a practice Tuesday and will be turning out again tonight.

Season tickets are going rather slow, reports Brown, and a blitz sale campaign is slated for this Saturday. Tickets are presently being sold in the Allison Hotel if anyone is interested in obtaining them.
