When the Vernon Blades found themselves over the weekend they found themselves in a big way.

Down on the fledgling season with four straight losses they swept over the Penticton Junior Vees twice, pumping in 10 goals and recording two shutouts.

The double victories put the Blades right back into Okanagan Junior Hockey League contention, five points behind the secondplace Kelowna Buckaroos who tied and lost in two meetings with Kamloops.

The weekend activity showed the Blades are getting into a good team after a slow start.

Scoring Punch

They have found their scoring punch for one thing. The line of Stein, Sherk and McNeil is hot as Hades at the moment, responsible for more than half the points collected in the two Penticton games.

Winger Bobby Stein is after the scoring leadership as he picked up five goals and an assist over the weekend. He scored four in the Peach City Friday and net-ted another here Saturday.

Another early season weakness, defence, has now become a strength. In the Friday-Saturday contests the Blades' blueline patrol really laid on the gristle in checking and showed more adeptness at getting the puck out of their zone.

"We have the best defence in the whole league right now," said coach Bill Brown. and not "They're tough afraid to mix it up if they have to."

Penticton's only dangerous scoring opportunity came in the first period when Vernon had two players in the sin bin. But Pirnak and his protective wall of defencemen held them off handily.

In other games over the weekend the Buckaroos and Rockets fought to a 6-6 tie in Kelowna Friday and then Kamloops broke out on top of the league standings by pasting the Buccos 10 to 5. They now have a two point bulge.
