This was the strong action decided upon at a meeting of the OJHL executive called Sunday here in Vernon to arrange playoff dates. It followed an official protest made to league president Don White by Rocket manager Don Brown about repeated poor player turnouts by the Penticton team road trips to Kamloops this year.

Brown said that for Saturday's game in Kamloops Penticton showed up with back in Penticton Friday, only six players and had to use borrowed Rocket players to fill out their team.

He claimed Penticton was ruining their arena gate for the playoffs and making a complete farce of the league as a whole.

He then recommended the Junior Vees be kicked out of the playoffs this year unless the situation was changed. President White followed up on his recommendation by agreeing to warn Penticton such action would be taken unless it could assure a minimum 12-player team for the playoffs.

Representatives from the Junior Vees organization were conspicuously absent at the league executive meeting held Sunday to decide a playoff date for the semi-

finals. However a tentative sched-

Gruber Fills Blades With Heavy 'Buck-shot'

Takes League Scoring Title, Cracks Hundred-Point Barrier

Number thirteen, traditional source of malignance and misfortune even within the sporting world, holds no fear to the Vernon Blades.

They've found their trouble stems from another numeral, equally odd and in their case equally awesome.

It's a big, black eleven and it's sewn on the white jersey representing 19-year-old Bob Gruber, captain and copious-scoring centerman for the Kelowna Buckaroos.

Big Number Eleven has been bothersome to the Blades all season but in two hockey games over the weekend he proved even more so.

Besides helping to lead the Buckaroos to first place in the Okanagan Junior League via Vernon, Gruber also took the opportunity to crown himself scoring king, collecting seven points for a recordbreaking total of 103.

Amassed Points

Friday night in Kelowna he potted one goal and assisted on two others as the Bucks won 7-2 to clinch the OJHL title, then in Saturday's closing game of the regular season here in Vernon he amassed a two goal, two-assist count of four to break the century mark in points and help scuttle the Blades 5-4 in overtime.

Vernon ended the season, cut short by eight games to make way for a lengthened playoff schedule, deep in third place with nine wins and 22 losses. Such a position in the OJHL means they must now meet first-place Kelowna in a best-out-of-seven semifinal series beginning Saturday, February 9. Meanwhile, Kamloops Rockets, who came second in standings, will play the lowly Penticton Junior Vees.

There was no doubt the Blades badly wanted a pair of wins from the Bucks to close out regular play. They had a golden opportunity to bog them down and allow Kamloops to close a four-point gap and regain a tie,

meaning possibly another playoff opponent.

But Gruber and Co. stood stolidly in the way despite all their determined and spirited efforts.

Saturday these efforts came closest to fruition as they played one of their best games against the Bucks all season.

Fought Back

Down 2-1 after the first period the Blues fought back to take leads of 3-2 and 4-3, only to have Kelowna catch them late in the third and kill them in overtime.

Speedy winger Terry Kasubuchi scored the eventual winner midway through the extra frame, slapping in Gruber's loose rebounder inches from the goal line.

It was also Number Eleven who helped knot the score at 4-4 with less than two minutes left in the third, feeding the puck to defenceman Ken Kitsch on a slick play.

Gruber got both his goals on sheer speed and pluck, beating Vernon blueliners out of the corners and scoring unassisted at point - blank range. Ron Lakes got the other Kelowna goal on a deflection from Kitsch.

Corky Agar broke a long scoring slump with a brace to lead the Blades' attack. He opened first period scoring with a sharp backhander that slipped through Sid Shussel's pads and then gave Vernon a 3 2 lead in the second on a scintillating, unassisted play.

Kelowna outshot Vernon 29-26 in the game which started off very slowly but reached a screaming pace at the finish. Twelve penalties were levied including a game misconduct to Dale Sorochuk for interrupting an affray between Nuyens and Ralph Kirschner.

Invaluable centerman Bob Stein left the game late in the third with undetermined injuries suffered in a collision along the boards.

Friday's clash in Kelowna was also a close-knit affair most of the distance, Vernon trailing the Bucks 3-2 early in the third period.

Then the league-leaders exploded in predictable fashion, scoring four fast goals to take a 7-2 decision. They had notched two earlier, one in each period.

Fred Thomas and Harvey Stolz flashed the red light twice between them to lead the way, followed by Gruber, Phil Larden and Terry Kasubuchi each with single tallies.

Bob Stein took care of Blade goals, both scored in the final period.

Blades have a week to recoup and prepare for the upand-coming playoffs. Practices will be held tonight at 6 p.m. and Tuesday night from 8 to 9 p.m.
