Vernon Blades made their exit off the Okanagan Junior Hockey League stage in a blaze of glory Tuesday night.

They left it reluctantly and disappointedly, but to the testimony of 1200 spectators packed into Kelowna Memorial Arena, fighting all the way.

Fighting all the way until time, and another OJHL season ran out for them at 9:52 of a 10-minute over-time period. That's when Fred Thomas, Kelowna Buckaroos' shifty centerman, got a breakaway and blasted their hopes of extending the semi-final playoffs to a sixth

He beat Gary Holland with a high shot to the upper left hand corner of the net with eight seconds left to give the Bucks their seventh goal of the night and the right to meet Kamloops Rockets in the OJHL finals.

That goal hushed a crowd of more than 100 visiting Vernon fans howling with delirious joy. For only 20 seconds before, winger Corky Agar had brought the Blades from a near 6-5 defeat with a clutch goal, his second of the night, to what looked to be new life for them in the

Kelowna as usual, had captain Bob Gruber leading scoring with a hat trick and two assists with Thomas collecting a brace. Ralph Kirschner and rookie John Strong garnered singles and Wayne Horning set up two goals.

Nine minor penalties were levied by referee Al Swain, five going to Kelowna. Although there was plenty of solid and sometimes savage checking, tempers on both clubs held very well, the tempo of the game dominating everything.
