## Jr. Blades Look Alive—Win First

### Corky Agar Scores Brace To Roll Over Rockets

VERNON 3, KAMLOOPS 2

Vernon Blades re-awoke to the hockey they're capable of playing Tuesday night and were justly rewarded for their efforts.

The Blades, in by far their best showing of the young season, delighted a small Civic Arena crowd by posting their first Okanagan Junior "A" Hockey League victory after four straight defeats, edging Kamloops Rockets 3-2.

It was a ding-dong battle with the Blades jumping to a 3-0 lead in the first two periods, then staving off a furious Rocket rally in the dying minutes of the third that came within one goal of nullifying the whole kabood-

The win left the Blues still in the cellar but only a game behind second-place Kelowna Buckaroos and two off the league-leading pace set by Kenny Stewart's Rockets.

Starring for the Blades Tuesday night was sophomore centre Corky Agar who scored two goals and generally kept the Kamloops blueline brigade in catfits with his fancy stickwork flashy skating. Agar's line, in fact, was the clickiest of the night, with wingmen Frank Harrison and Dale Sorochuk setting him up perfectly on his double tally.

Alternate centre man Bobby Stein scored the third and winning goal unassisted late in the second period. Agar's brace came early in the first.

Brian Woodward worked so hard in the Vernon net Tuesday he deserved a shutout but the Rockets had other ideas. With less than six minutes to full time Rick McShane and Brian Fourt put the Red and White right back in the game with two quick counters scored while the Vernon defence lapsed its vigilance.

The rookie 17-year-old goaltender looks better with every game and he was a stone wall until McShane cracked through in the third. He was particularly outstandng in the first period when the Rockets

Agar put the Blades ahead 1-0 at 2:36 of the first period when he batted in a short pass from Sorochuk off the end boards behind the Kamloops net. It was screened and Rocket goalie Lee Simpson had no chance.

The sharpshooting centre made it 2-0 at the nine-minute mark on a beautiful play set up by Harrison. The left juggled the puck flipped a pin-point pass dead son, Sorochuk (12:51). on target.

The Rockets got hot in the Woodward last half of the first frame Simpson

and Woodward had his work cut out swallowing pucks.

#### See-saw Session

The second period was a see-saw session with both sides threatening. Stein fired in the eventual winner at 15:03, slapping in a rebound during a frenzied scramble in front of Simpson.


