The rich got richer and the poor inevitably got poorer when Vernon Blades paid their sixth visit of the season to Rocketville Wednesday night.

The Rockets, currently sitting fat and happy atop the Okanagan Junior "A" Hockey League, added a little more padding to their plush pulpit by stomping on the powerless and pauperish Blades, 11-1.

The victory, their eleventh straight on home ice, boosted them four points ahead of second running Kelowna Buckaroos who they caught and left behind last weekend by sweeping a home-and-away series, 6-3 and 7-4.

The Rockets now have 30 points on 15 wins, the Cowboys trail with 26 on 13 victories.

And the Blades? Well, if you possess a powerful set of peepers and you squint hard enough you might make out a vague shape down the cellar steps at about the eightpoint level. Yeah, Charlie, that's them!

As the score blatantly advertises, Wednesday night's game wasn't what you'd call a "could - have - gone - either way" affair. It was an even steven match for 49 seconds to be exact, the time it took for the Rockets to rifle in the first of their 11 goals after the initial faceoff formalities.

The Blades, it should be admitted, did their best or tried to but it just wasn't sufficient to muffle the incessant roar of Kenny Stewart's Missilemen.

And anyway what, if I may be so free to ask, can you possibly do with one defenceman?

Because that's all the Blades had Wednesday, a tireless gent by the name of Jim Stephen and nine forwards. Two of Vernon's rearguards, Gordie Nuyens and Wilf Tantrum, have quit and a third, Dave MacKay, was hitting the books for Christmas exams.

So it meant that Stephen had to go the full sixty minutes with members of the forward brigade doing doubletime to fill in the other rearguard slot. Actually, Stephen played 58 minutes as he earned an enforced but much welcome rest in the sin bin when he tripped a Rocketeer in the second period.

On Defensive

Such a situation automatically put the Blades on the defensive from the opening whistle and, except for occasional sorties into the Rocket zone, that's the way they had to play it.

The Rockets, as expected, had a field day in point-collecting, and all three of their
