Bucs Given Scare By Spunky Blades,

Lowly Vernon Jrs. Force Overtime Before Dying

Lowly Boston Bruins rocked the professional hockey world by toppling Toronto's mighty Maple Leafs 11-0 Saturday and equally humble Vernon Blades the same night sent a shiver through the Okanagan Junior "A" Hockey League by almost upsetting Kelowna Buckaroos for their first road victory of the season.

Almost—but not quite. The Buckaroos, trailing 4-3 in the third period with defeat but ten minutes away, faced the reality of their unfamiliar straits in time and surged back to take a tight 5-4 overtime decision and keep the Blades' spotless and winless road record intact.

Winger Terry Kasubuchi, who has been a particular nemesis to the Blades in recent games, tipped in a pass from Richard Bulach at the four-minute mark of the overtime session to bag it for the Bucks.

Earlier Harvey Stolz had locked the score at 4-4 when, with Kelowna a man short of all things, he snared a loose puck on a break-away to beat Brian Woodward.

Best Road Game

Yes, the Blades got axed again-for the 24th time this season—but in losing there was no shame because without a particle of doubt they played their best road game of the year Saturday night.

They played the kind of hockey they have usually only shown, and rarely at that, on home ice. Hockey that's capable of matching strides with either Kelowna or Kamloops.

Hockey that'll have to be reckoned with come playoff time in February when league standings are kaput and the chips are down.

Twice the Buckaroos had to fight from behind Saturday. The Blades, at one time, held a 2-0 lead as late as the second period but the Bucks recovered with an unanswered hat-trick to take a 3-2 edge early in the third.

Then the Blues recouped with another sudden pair and the Bucks found themselves looking down the gun barrels again. Alas, for the Blades, they made another comeback and this time they made it stick.

Stolz was Kelowna's big boomer, scoring two goals including that all-important third period equalizer. Singles were notched by Doug Chishom, Terry Strong and, of

course, that bothersome Mr. Kasubuchi.

Scoring for the Blades was defenceman Jim Stephen and wingers Allan Rogan, Dale Sorochuk and Buck Sherk. A fifth goal was tallied by centreman Ike Coulter in the second period but it was disallowed ,the whistle having already blown on a penalty call.

Vernon had the edge in the penalty parade but were outshot 39-29, Woodward doing a spectacular job in the Blade nets, particularly on breakaway situations.

The first period was hardchecking and close to the vest Stephen finally got through to flash the red light for Vernon, slapping in a hard bullet, unassisted.

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In the second period the Blades upped their lead to 2-0 on a real "weirdo" if there ever was one. The Vernon squad was short-handed at the time and the Bucks were applying tremendous pressure with their power play platoon out in full force. On one particular scoring

Then Terry, the younger t member of the Strong duet, clicked on a pass from Ken Kivisto to tie it. Coulter, with Kelowna two men short, followed up with a power goal from Corky Agar only to see it go for nought.

Stolz and Bulach started off the third period with a bang, stick-handling through the entire Blade aggregation to score, Stolz doing the honors. This made it 3-2 and it looked like curtains for the Blues at last.

Not so, said Sorochuk and Sherk, who promptly put the Vernon crew, 11 strong, back in the saddle and in spitting distance of an upset with two quickies.

Then Stolz gave the Blades a taste of their own medicine by scoring while the Bucks were short-handed and under the squeeze.

Kasubuchi's tip-in settled the argument for good and all but the Blades came inches-close to salvaging a 5-5 tie with a furious rally in the dying seconds of overtime.
