Nuyens Named OJHL's Most Valuable Player

Vernon Blades salvaged some glory from a colorless season this week with the announcement that Gordie Nuyens, their hard - hitting, defenceman. been named the Okanagan Junior "A" Hockey League's Most Valuable Player. Nuyens, the Blades' assist-

honor.

In addition Nuyens was a unanimous pick for one of two defence spots on the OJHL's first all-star team. This was the second season in a row he had been chosen as an all-star defenceman. He also won a more dubious honor as the league's badman, collecting 112 minutes in penalties over the season.

The Most Valuable Player Award has been up for com-

petition for three years. Last season league-scoring champion Bob Gruber of Kelowna Buckaroos won the title and the year before that Buck Crawford, defenceman of the Kamloops Rockets. Stephen Picked

Jim Stephen, Nuyens' fellow blueliner and Blade team captain, was the only other Vernon junior picked to an all-star slot. He tied with Kamloops' gentlemanly Terry Shishido for a defence position on the second team.

Filling the other rearguard post on the first all-star squad with Nuyens is Rocket slap-shot artist Ken Rinaldi. Another Rocket, Lee Simpson, who tied with stand-in Harvey Budarick for the top goals-against average over the season, got the nod as goaltender.

On the forward line two more Kamloops juniors won elite spots. Eric Shishido, who just missed the league scoring title by two points to teammate Larry Roberge, was picked to centre a line with smooth-skating Glen Richards on left wing and Kelowna's steady Richard Bullock on right.

Kenny Stewart, the old "Grey Ghost," had no trouble nailing down a job as coach of this choice collection of puck stars, his achievement in guiding the Kamloops Rockets to their third straight OJHL championship, speaking for itself. On the

second all-star team Kelowna's Richard Robinson was named in goal, Stephen and Shishido to one defence slot and Kamloops' Bill Steinke to the other.

Murray Owen, another Rocket, won out at centre with comrade-in-arms Dale Sandyke at right wing and Buckaroo captain Harvey Stolz on the left side. Don Culley of Kelowna was picked as coach.

The all-star selections were made by the various coaches and managers of the three OJHL teams.

Kamloops Rockets' centre Eric Shishido has won an abbreviated version of the scoring race he lost by two points to teammate Larry Roberge this season.

According to final statistics on the Okanagan Junior "A" Hockey League round robin playoffs just completed Shishido topped the scoring parade with eight goals and 11 assists for 19 points.

Five points back in second with 14 apiece were fellow Rockets Murray Owen and Paul Levens and in third Dale Budarick, Kam. 4 13 3.25 Sandyke with 13.

The Rockets won the OJHL championship for a third successive season, winning six and losing two, the latter pair to Vernon Blades.

The Blades and Kelowna Buckaroos had one game remaining in the round robin schedule but cancelled it. Kamloops played their full

The Blades' big gun in the playoffs was centre Bobby Stein who put together five goals and four assists for nine points and a tie for fifth place with four others. Allan Rogan produced the biggest surprise in the playoffs for the Blades, potting five goals and setting up three more for eight points.

Harvey Budarick of Kamloops emerged over alternate Lee Simpson as the top goaltender in the playoffs, allowing 13 goals in four games for a 3.25 average. Simpson had a 4.75.
