Versus Bucks

Crucial Series Awaits Blades

right pronto.

And pronto means this weekend when the Blades face Kelowna Buckaroos in a pair of crucial home and away Okanagan Junior "A" Hockey League encounters.

The Blades, in case you have lost touch recently, are nicely ensconced in the aforesaid cellar with only one win in six starts this

season.

They trail league leading and so far undefeated, Kam-loops Rockets by 10 points, second place Kelowna by four and third place Penticton-Summerland Broncos by two.

And they could be a little farther behind after this weekend unless they do a

radical about-face.

Coach Hap Schafer knows this full well so he is aiming for a possible two-game sweep or, failing that, at least a split to keep the Blades above water level.

Friday night the Blades invade the territory of the Buckaroos in the first phase of Operation About-Face with the second round being set for Vernon Civic Arena Saturday night. Faceoff times are 8:30 p.m. for both games.

Hauling down the high riding Buckaroos won't be child's play. They weren't easy marks the last time the Blades played them and they figure to be even less co - operative this time around because they've strengthened their lineup considerably in the interim.

Among the promising newcomers the Blades can expect to see in Buckaroo livery are Lynton Swanson, a 170-pound left winger late of the Edmonton Oil Kings camp and Ward Dayle, a towering six-foot, four-inch forward from Ladner.

Both boys have made their respective presences felt since joining the Bucks a week ago, particularly Swanson who notched three goals and two assists in his first two OJHL outings.

Naturally the Buckaroos will be steaming after suffering double defeat at the hands of the Rockets last weekend so the Blades will have their work cut out for them.

No lineup changes are contemplated although coach Schaefer may just go with new and, as yet, untried goalie Jerry Maier this weekend.

The Blades are hoping to acquire one or two more players from out of town to fill some weak holes in the roster.
