This will allow the Broncos to visit Vernon on New Year's Day. The original schedule called for the Blades to play in Penticton.

The Blades probably won't be faced with the same drastic player shortage they had last weekend in that ill-fated series with the Buckaroos. Although they are liable to be short one or so (defenceman Gary Koski for sure) coach Hap Schaefer should be able to draw from juvenile ranks for reserve strength.

Centre George Watson, in particular, would provide a big boost to the juniors. So would defenceman Gordie Clarke.

Norm Schiman will likely start in goal again but Brian Woodward may be on hand to fill in should the emergency arise.

The Rockets may have lost their last three decisions to the Blades but you can be sure they won't be soft touches. They're in a tight battle for first place at the moment and they'll be going full blast to hold or, if possible, widen their one-point margin over Kelowna.

All in all it looks as if junior hockey fans are in for some top-notch holiday entertainment when the Blades and Rockets come to grips.
