Blades Go Down Fighting To Smooth Penticton Unit

Penticton Broncs came on strongly in the second half of the Okanagan Junior "A" Hockey League game in Vernon Saturday night to defeat the Vernon Blades 7-4.

Blades gave the game all they had but the seemingly better conditioned Broncs had the jump over the late stages of the game.

Larry Palanio turned into a one man wrecking crew for the high flying Penticton squadas he slammed in three goals and sparked on defence.

The smooth skating Palanio was a vital cog in the playmaking for the Penticton attack and besides his regular turn on the ice led the Penticton power play, and worked on the penalty killing unit.

For Blades newcomer Patty Phillips powered in two goals while smooth skating Bob Stein and defenceman Gord Clark added

singles.

Vernon took advantage of Penticton laxity in the opening minutes of the first period to storm into a 2-0 lead and the some 300 fans on hand could hardly believe their eyes.

Stein swept in at 1:14 of the opening frame to blink the red light unassisted for the first goal. Phillips blasted the puck into the rigging for the second counter at the 2:15 mark.

Then Penticton started to gain momentum as they roared to the attack. Moe Hayes got them started by knocking in a relay from Dwayne Biagioni at the 4:13 mark. Ray Price knotted the count at 11 minutes into the first period and Biagioni sent the visitors ahead to stay at 11:58 of the first frame.

From then on Vernon did little to aid their own cause except for a brief flurry when they surged back to tie the count in

the second period.

Near the end of the first period, a scuffle in front of the Vernon nets left Blades with two men in the penalty box. They played for a four minute span extending into the second period with three men

defending against five. The referees assessed 18 penalties — 11 to Vernon and most of these in the second and third periods.

The constant shortage of manpower left the hard working Blades on the penalty killing unit a bit overworked and took the steam out of the Vernon offence.

Penticton moved ahead 4-2 when Larry Palanio hammered in a double set-up from George Brant and Ron Robelato at 5:10 of the second period. Vernon had enough left for a final effort as they settled down to work on the Penticton lead.

Gord Clark took a Bob Stein pass out to the blue line and blazed a low whistler just inside the post to make the tally 4-3.

Then Patty Phillips was Johnny on the spot to slip in a loose puck after a tenacious Maurice Wernicke had struggled and fought his way through a maze of players to spring the puck at the side of the net.

With the score standing at 4-4 at the 11:22 mark of the second Penticton seemed to gather themselves for a major effort. At 18:54 Moe Hays swept in to beat Norm Shiman in the Vernon nets with a well placed blazer from the right side. Broncs took their 5-4 lead into the third and final stanza.

Palanio proved the spoiler as he slipped insurance markers past Shiman at the 1:59 and 4:18 marks of the final period.

Vernon tried hard and at one time held a two man advantage but penalties at the wrong time cut their attack down.

Blades will now prepare themselves to face Moose Jaw Canucks tonight in the Civic Arena.

With the win over Vernon, Penticton vaults into an early lead in the Okan-

agan Junior "A" Hockey League.

Friday they hosted the annual league champs, Kamloops Kraft Kings, and humbled the Hub City Squad

8-1 before a stunned Penticton crowd.

Palanio took the individual scoring lead by peppering in five goals in two games.
