A solid performance Tuesday night as they edged the Vernon Intermediates 3-2, couldn't erase the door of the fiasco when they met the Junior Blades

Monday night.

Moose Jaw put on an exhibition of dirty, uncontrolled tactics that were sofar removed from the expected show of skating and passing that Vernon fans were infuriated and didn't mind making their feelings

Lack of control was the crux of the whole matter as Moose Jaw coach Brian Shaw patiently ignored the first rule of coaching in any sport, he lost control

of his team.

The out and out brawl that forced calling of the game before full time was both unnecessary and a blot on the name of hockey in Vernon according to many

of those watching.

When Moose Jaw players took to the stands to go after some foul mouthed Vernon youths who had been ribbing them continuously throughout the game exhibited a fine set of "rabbit ears" for players supposedly destined for the major leagues of hockey.

Moose Jaw won the scoring parade, the penalty parade and they also won most of the fights to make a clean sweep of the evening's ac-

tivities.

Then the parade to the sin bin started. Moose Jaw proved far more adept at handing out elbows and butt ends without getting caught by the officials who had little warning of the explosion just around the cor-

When the less experienced Vernon team finally retaliated they were nailed for their infractions. However, finally the visitors didn't bother catering to the officials as they came out in the open with their rough house tactics.
