Personnel wise, Blades are slowly building into a strong club, lacking only a few experienced players for the depth needed for a

solid contender.

In goalie Norm Schiman, they have a netminder who could probably play anywhere in the league. The agile Schiman has an average of nearly 40 saves per game. Generally goals that elude his grasp are unsavable. The wonder is that he manages to turn aside as many as he does.
