Vernon Blades were humiliated 9-2 and 15-1 over the weekend and angry fans are beginning to holler.

Several fans who have followed hockey for years through many ups and downs said following Saturday night's comedy of errors "Things have to change or Junior Hockey is out."

Only 100 fans turned out to see Saturday's game and many of these won't grace the arena again to see the Juniors in action.

Vernon dressed 11 men and a goalie for the Penticton tilt and kept up with the Broncs for a period and some odd minutes. Then Penticton began the fireworks. They blasted in nine goals during the middle and latter stages of the second frame.

From any standpoint the games was a shambles. Goalie Norm Schiman was given a chance on only four of the Penticton goals by those in the know who watched the slaughter.

The rest were point blank shots or break away rambles as Penticton tore the Vernon defence to shreds. Had it not been for a couple of dozen spectacular saves by Schiman the scorer would have needed a com-

With only two lines and one odd man on the bench, Vernon left a player unused for the latter half of the

The handful of fans were amazed when they saw forwards Dale Sorochuk and Bob Stein line up on defence while regular blue liners Gil Morrow and Ted Palm were shuttled to the forward line.

Even Vernon's lone goal, credited to Bob Stein on a drive from the point, would have missed the net had not Penticton's Larry Palanio tried to knock the puck down and instead turned it into his own net.

Dissention is reported within the squad. While ac-curate reports were not available at press time it was thought that differences between players and management of the club had caused much of the trouble.

Proponents of this scheme said however, that current management of the club would balk at such an arrangement or any similar set-up.

An alternative play suggested by the above group would be to begin a second junior team in the city which would have the approval of the Okanagan Jun-ior Hockey League, who are considerably worried about the Vernon situation as their gates drop whenever Vernon hits town.

With the deadline for player additions strengthen only a couple of weeks away whatever is done must be done quickly, hockey officials pointed

out.
"We could get players
from the prairies and elsewhere but they won't come here once they hear of the situation," one disgusted official said.
