They skated good enough to beat Kamloops Kraft Kings 6-5 in overtime Friday and except for a few lapses Saturday, clung with the Kings most of the way falling short of victory on a 7-4 score.

Kelowna Buckaroos were busy beating Penticton 6-1 to leave the Peach City six one point ahead of Kraft Kings in the fight for the second playoff spot. If Blades can beat Kamloops here in Civic Arena Saturday night then they go against Penticton in the semifinals. If they lose they meet the same Kings, who need nothing short of a win to assure them of second spot.

There were other bright spots in the Blades' lineup Friday.

Centre Bob-Stein pushed his way further up the scoring ladder with a five point effort including the winning goal. Maurice Wernike, who scrapped his way to set up Vernon's first marker, proved that work is the best route to reward as he claimed the tying goal.

Kraft Kings lept to a 4-0 lead before Maier turned the toils of Wernike and Bill Nixon into meaning and then Neil Bilodeau, with a close in shot, and Wayne Blackburn, with a blast from the blueline drew Blades within a goal at the end of the second period.

Kamloops had taken their 3-0 first frame lead on goals by Eric Shishido, with two, and Robbie Jamison.
