Kelowna Buckaroos and Kamloops Kraft Kings closed out the 1965-'66 edition of the Omjaha (Okanagan Mainline Junior A Hockey Associaton) schedule on about as high a note as any team could hope to hit over the weekend.

Locally, Vernon Blades sank to a new low as they failed to win at least one contest in a two game set

for the first time in the month of January.

Buckaroos, who had been conceded first place in Omjaha already a month ago, took Blades apart Friday night with a 5-2 win in the Orchard City.

Kraft Kings' task was not as easy as the 6-1 score would indicate but it was good enough to provide them with a second place finish in the circuit, one point better than Penticton—Summerland El Rancho Broncs.

Playoffs begin this coming weekend as Blades travel first to Kamloops and then host the Kraft Kings in Vernon either Saturday night or Sunday afternoon in series "B" of the semifinals. Penticton will visit Kelowna before hosting the Buckaroos in series "A". Each set-to will be a best of seven round with neutral referees and hometown linesmen officiating.

Kamloops scored three times in the first period, twice in the second and traded goals with Blades in the third.

R bbie Osborne paced the attack for visitors with two. Singletons came from Charlie Cook, Dale Sandyke, Jack Moores and Rick McShane. League point champion Eric Shishido was held to two assists.

Wernicke got what could have been the turning point for Blades but it was the old story of too little too late. He played his usually aggressive game and was rewarded by a Bob Stein pass to take Blades off of the skunksheet.
