Blades Bow Down To Kraft Kings

Vernon Down But Not Out

Vernon Juniors sliced into Kamloops Kraft Kings over the past weekend and came out a very dull Blade indeed. Blades were bested by a fired-up Kamloops crew 6-3 in the Hub City Saturday and fell victim to an 8-6 beating before their largest crowd of the season in Civic Arena Sunday night.

Meanwhile in series "A" of the Okanagan Mainline Junior A Hockey Association semi-finals Kelowna fought from behind to garner a tie in regulation time and then go on to knot their series at Penticton with an overtime tally. Buckaroos lost the first game of the series to Broncos in Kelowna folding like an accordion after holding a 3-0 lead in the first period of the game.

The Kings' second win put them up two games to none over the underdog Blades who must win Tuesday night in Kamloops and again Thursday as the series swings back to Vernon to stay in the thick of things in OMJAHA playoffs.

A ten minute lapse in the final frame proved fatal for Blades in their loss at Kamloops while a rally lasting almost the same length of time in Vernon wasn't quite good enough to turn their toils into success.

Blades 6 Kraft Kings 8 Tom Williamson slapped in two goals exactly 27 seconds apart but could not come up with the clincher in Blues' fight-right-back in the third period Sunday night.

Eric Shishido, craftiest of the Kraft Kings, could. As well as taking all the

color out of the Blues with a breakaway goal at 17:42 mark of the last period he guided three others into the Vernon net.

Kamloops opened the scoring early in the initial stanza beating Blades' pipeguarder Norm Schiman twice on a brace of tip-ins.

Fittingly, Shishido broke the ice scooping home a pass from Dale Sandyke, and Sandyke in turn shoveled in the diggings of Shishido less than a minute later.

Neil Belideau twined Vernon's first answer with a rebound shot first played by linemate Dale Sorochuck but three more Kraft King goals left them with a 5-1 advantage after the first period.

Don Anthony, Shishido and Sandyke scored in that order for Kings.

Blades outscored visitors in the second period 2-0 and traded counters of three in the third.

Ivan (the Wonderful) Malinoski popped home the first of the Vernon goals with a slap-shot which started just outside the blueline. He struggled through with the help of rearguard Abby Gamble. Alan Southward was good

for Blades' second sandwich session marker, another blistering slapper, this time from just inside the blue barrier.

Two Kamloops' goals all but silenced the Vernon club in the last session. Shishido got his third at 4:23 and Roy Sakaki guided home the score that sent them back up by four just past the mid-way mark of the last stanza.

Then Williamson got his two exactly 27 seconds apart and Southward claimed his second on the night less than a minute later to put Blades back into the hockey game.

But wily Eric Shishido changed the happy picture to one of tragedy as far as local fans and players were concerned finally beating Schiman with a breakaway bundle at 17:42.

Twenty penalties were called — 13 to Kamloops.

BLUELINE...Both Norm Schiman of Vernon and Harvey Budarick of Kamloops had their work cut out for them. Schiman stopped 37 shots while his counterpart got in front of 31 Blade blasts earmarked scoresheet...somebody got his rule book mixed up when he assessed Blades' Norm Schiman with a game misconduct. Ordinarily any player involving himself in a scuffle between two other players draws himself the automatic game misconduct. It is not so in the case of a goalie. Goalie are given the five minute penalty, served by another player.
