Blades meet Broncos


The Vernon Junior Blades, who are faced with their toughest weekend test since opening night, can be in second place in the four Team Okanagan Junior Hockey League by Monday.

Blades, sporting a three game win streak (also the total number of wins) which is one shy of the four it took them all last season to accumulate, meet the Penticton Broncs in the Peach City tomorrow and then swing back home against the same squad Saturday night. Penticton is in second place in the OJHL, just four points ahead of the upstart Blueshirts.

A double coup would put Blades in second place by virtue of a better goalsfor and goals against average and leave them sitting more than ready for the Kelowna Buckaroos the following Saturday.

Penticton will send a good crew against Blades, if not the toughest locals will have faced so far this season, which is headed by Gene Peacosh, who shunned the Edmonton camp to return to his native city. He was the chief reason Blades were beaten last time out (getting a hattrick) and he will be in the line-up both nights, also for the first time in Vernon this year.
