Vernon opened the scoring in the Peach City when Ivan Malinosky teamed with Tom Williamson after only 28 seconds of play, Malinosky then got help from the third of the Blades "Production Line" Lawrence Quechuck, at 5:29, taking a pass at centre-ice, outhipping a Bronco defenseman at the blueline and then litting the upper left hand

man at the blueline and then hitting the upper left hand corner with the payload. But the quick lead was short-lived for Blues. Penticton bounced back at 7:45 when Ray Picco scored his first of three goals of the night. Bob Mowat tallied again at 13 minutes flat to tet the score and then Picco set up Larry Palanio with the go-ahead goal at 16:10.

Ski Tips with Goudge member, C.S.I.A.

As I have mentioned before skiing requires strong legs and springy knees—therefore we must develop the thigh and calf muscles.

Here are a few more ex-Here are a few more exercises which will help to get your legs in shape for the ski season. Practise these exercises daily if they are to be of any benefit to you.

1. Standing with head and back to the wall — feet 12" from the wall, slide down until thighs are parallel to the floor. Hold this position until you are completely tired. Practise till you can stay down for three minutes. minutes.

2. Skiers Bend: Feet slightly apart, hands above head — without bending knees touch toes. Now assume sitting position, arms outstretched.

3. Place two books (two inches thick) on the floor about two feet from the wall and stand with toes on the end of books. Place hands shoulder height on wall. Using calf muscles slowly raise heels, Put toes to the wall, keep body straight. Push back to original position, lower heels to the floor. Repeat 10 times slowly increasing 10 times slowly increasing by two daily.

Golf course to be built at Fauquier

A nine-hole golf course to be built at the new com-munity of Fauquier is ex-pected to become a major recreational asset for both residents and visitors in the Central Arrow Lakes

The golf course, to be built on a 45 - acre site alongside the Arrow reservoir, will be a joint undertaking of the Needles-Edgewood Centennial Commit-

wood Centennial Committee and B.C. Hydro.
Hydro will provide the site and up to \$15,000 to develop it, as well as technical and engineering assistance. In addition, Hydro may be able to provide a relocated building to serve as a club house although no definite commitment with respect to this building has yet been given. given.

Responsibility for building, operating and maintaining the golf course is expected to be assumed by a club which the Needles-Edgewood Centennial Com-mittee will arrange to have established for this pur-pose under the Societies

When this club is formed Hydro will be prepared to lease it the land for golf course purposes for a term of 21 years with provision for renewal of the lease for a further 21 years. Annual rental will be \$10.

the dull edge

PENTICTON - At this time of the year the city is protected most by its two lakes which sit on either side of the Penticton limits acting as the insulating walls of a giant thermos and keeping it, at least, pleasantly warm while the surrounding countryside is getting cold enough to freeze the roots of their Chamber of Com-

merce famous-type peach trees.

Downtown, merchants are grumbling about the way they are being forced to get rid of neon advertising lights on the main thoroughfare; housewives are starting to complain about rising food prices; and the working stiff, realizing his city is, afterall, no different than millions of others, well, he'll just have another pint, thanks, and then run along. And later he might load the wife and kids into the car and take them down to the Memorial Arena for the Okanagan Junior Hockey League fixture between the Broncos and the visiting Vernon team ... "what's their name?"

At Memorial Arena, a good half hour before the game, a man look at his team and studies the task facing them. For five days of the week he's a working stiff too. But tonight (and tomorrow night) he's Alexander the Great, Napoleon, Atilla the Hun (to the opposition) and Father Chrsitmas, all rolled into

He is Odie Lowe. And as Odie Lowe pushes the brown hat further back on his head, he scratches his scalp as if he is hoping a small bug will crawl out and into his ear and tell him what to say to his boys. He is their coach, their leader, the boss.

Pre-game speeches are not his forte. But the 12 of them listen intently anyway. He made winners out of them before and they are certain he can do it

again.

He has to choose his words carefully. It's got to be short and, anything but sweet. It has to be short because he's only got a good sentence or two of time to get his message across before they are done with their taping and lacing up their skates and fitting elbow pads in place under the travelling white sweaters of the Vernon Blades, the current toast of the valley hockey circuit, and begin to feel the pre-game knots and start to "think" again.

It can't be sweet either. He's got to shake them, yes. Keep them loose, yes. But not make it sound too easy. No, don't make it sound like a water treading

contest ...

Through it all, he keeps his cool. and when he's

ready, he speaks.

He doesn't ask them to play good. Or tough, Or rough, He doesn't tell them to backcheck or forecheck or stay out of the penalty box. These things are understood. They're not kids anymore. Guys their age are already playing in the National Hockey League. They learned early in "life" that if they couldn't cut it they couldn't stay. It's the survival of the fittest. He knows it and so do they. He doesn't have to tell them and they don't have to lis-

Instead, he touches on a couple of sore points which have been costly to Blades of late. He tells them to keep their sticks down and to take the penalty, when they get one, without grip-ing. Then he claps his hands and tells them to get up and

out onto the ice. In the first period, before a very blased crowd (as

Junior followings are prone to be), his team holds their own. Tom Williamson and Ivan Malinoski (who with Lawrence Quechuck, make up the production line) have scored two goals before five minutes of play. The Blades look good and appear on their way to a rout. But the Broncos fight back and pop in three just as quick goals and Lowe has them in the dressingroom again:

Goalie Gerry Allen, who is to allow eight goals to find the mesh behind him during the course of the game, is unhappy. They "only" got 15 shots on him and three goals or better than one for every five shots. He had little to cheer about either, in the second period, when he was forced to get in front of 26 more and this time, like the boy holding back the ocean by sticking his finger into the dike, it just couldn't be done. Penticton gets three more goals and the young netminder has "all I want for Christmas is two defensemen... "ringing around in his head as they take another break.

He might just as well have saved it. In the third period, after Lowe had issued his charges orders to settle down and play the game, the fans really took over. The quiet little city of Penticton, led by an idiot fringe of no more than three or four, erupted like Vesuvius. Nobody was left out of it. Programs and popcorn were hurtled onto the ice and even an old duffer, who brought it along, one would imagine, for a nip, had his Thermos bottle extracted from his hands and heaved to centre ice also.

The near riot centred around a call that saw two Broncs sitting in the penalty box, at which time Blades scored one goal to get back into the game. When it was finally put down the Vernon bench was heap-

ed with abuse. Not even then did Lowe lose his cool. He said "onto the ice" and all of his play-
