Bucks 7 Blades 4 KELOWNA — A goal by Tom Serviss after just 10 seconds in the game ap-peared all Blades needed to get them rolling Friday night. But the Buckaroos, playing one of their best skating matches of the season, fought back, and threatened to runaway with the game on the strength of their 4-2 lead after two periods, before Blades could pull them up short with a 4-4 draw in the first 60 minutes of play.

Serviss, teamed with Lawrence Quechuck and Ivan Malinosky, when Quechuck wasn't sitting out a fighting major for mixing it with Buckaroos Mike Meechan in the second period, and Malinosky wasn't benched with a misconduct after disputing Kelowna's fourth goal, pro-vided Blues with their best one-two punch of the sea-son. Keith Rolston, playing perhaps his best game as a Blade, and Alan Southward, split by centreman Tom Williamson, spread the scoring around.

Serviss scored his opener on Blades first skate up the ice and the Buckaroos trailed until Bob Muir, one of three new youngsters from Kimberley to bolster the Central City line-up, found the mark at 6:17, just after King Cam returned to the ice following an elbowing pen-

Brian Fisher, the Okanagan Junior Hockey League's top point-getter, fir-ed Bucks second marker at 7:12, when he persisted in shoving the puck under the body of Blades goalie Gerry Allen after a third

Allen again had to be called upon to stop over 50 shots while Buckaroos Rex Rideout handled the rubber 27 times.

Many of Blades shots missed the net. Rolston, who with Williamson and Quechuck, got the biggest portion of bad luck around the Kelowna cage, finally got on target less than a minute later to re-tie the game. Taking a pass from Southward, the rugged winger slamed it behind Rideout from 10 feet in front of the net.

Fisher got his second goal of the night at 13:14 digging at Allen until the puck trickled free and into the Vernon net.

The fourth Kelowna goal, scored when Butch Deadmarch gobbled up a rebound and stuck it into the his 10 minute sentence afearned Malinosky ter he chased referee Mike Durban and all it did was slow down the Vernon attack, which had its hands full containing the Bucks for the rest of the period.

The third session was all Blades. After trading near misses with Bucks in the early part of the frame, Blades finally found the mark. At 13:09 Malinosky redeemed himself by knif-ing through two Kelowna defenders in a move he has patented. And at 18:24, with time almost up for Blades, Williamson scored his line's second counter waltzing in untouched from a face-off in the Kelowna end.

The overtime period of 10 minutes belonged, once

more, to the Buckaroos.

FALKLAND - Progress was made on the Curling Club building at the week-end. Working members of the club completed the closing in of the sides and the building is now reasonably weatherproof. Wiring has progressed very well although there is still much to be done.

The floor is levelled off and awaits the attaching of the header pipes. Several thousand feet of one inch plastic pipe must be laid on this floor, attached to the two header pipes and securely anchored at the north end so they will lie flat on the floor about four inches, apart, across the whole width of the two feet. sheets twenty four Sand will be spread to fill in the spaces between the pipes. A large tank in the pump

room will hold a mixture of water and a ton of cal-cium chloride. a pump will circulate the there, brine through the refrigerating unit and through the plastic pipes in the rink. Another pump will bring water from the well to supply the rink for the brine mixture, ice, washrooms and kitchen.

Washrooms and kitchen must still be built in but the main structure is now enclosed. It is a credit to the community and especially to the half dozen or so men who have done most of the organizing and much of the labor thus far. Many have helped a little when it suited convenience.
