Goalie Gerry Allen was the only real light in Blades dark weekend despite the 14 shots which eluded him against the Broncos. He stopped 66 others and was the determining factor in Blueshirts staying in the game with the hard pressing Buckaroos.

Friday night Broncos Gene Peacosh turned in a hat-trick plus one by scoring four goals while defenseman Jackie Taggart

and forward Ken Connors blasted a brace each. Singles came from Tom Madden, Russ Chernoff, Larry Palanio, Terry Lux-ton, Ray Picco and Pete O'Neil. Vernon marksmen were Tom Williamson and Bruce Allen.

Blades trailed 3-0 after the first period, shared four markers with Broncos in the second stanza and suffered a 9-0 shut-out in the

King Cam, never on friendly terms with Penticton's Memorial Arena at the best of times, made an early exit from the game. At the 8:02 mark of the first period he digressed with the referee on a tripping charge, was given a 10-minute misconduct and before it was over was ejected from the contest.

Monday afternoon the Blades looked like a winner until 16:50 of the third period when they blew a 3-1 lead. Up until that time and due primarily to the staunch goaltending of Gerry Allen, Blades were well on their way to vicAllen stopped 53 shots including two breakaways to Brian Fisher and Keith Boquist and had a shut-out going for him until the early part of the third period.

Lawrence Quechuck, who opened the scoring in the game at 7:30 to the second session, finished the day with two goals and two assists, settingk up line-mate Tom Serviss for Blades other two goals. Blades held their lead

Quechuck got Blades going again in the overtime making the score 5-4 after only 1:51 by stealing the puck behind the Kelowna net and sticking it behind Rex Rideout. But it wasn't enough. At 3:17 Fisher tied the contest and at 3:59 and 8:08, Couves added tiebreaker and insurance markers.

Blueshirts meet the Edmonton Movers in Civic Arena tonight at 8:30 p.m. and will be on the road this weekend, playing a return match in Penticton Friday night and a contest Kamloops Saturday evening.

The ups and the downs of the Vernon Blades are preparing coach Odie Lowe as a prime candidate for physicatric row. But the way the Blades mentor talked following Monday afternoon's give-away to the Kelowna Buckaroos in overtime, he is not as close to the door as some of his Blades are.

Now, he has paced the tunnel and expressed disatisfaction over his Blueshirts play before. But it was usually a case of get-ting worked up over a number of things which led to a loss and he ultimately has a mild change of heart

Monday afternoon, for the first time this year, he was more disturbed than he was angry.
"I thought we could keep

up with Kelowna and Penticton," he said. "But I guess we just don't have the horses." He kicked a bit as was his custom and he tried to think for words to express his extreme grief. But they didn't score. He wasn't burned, he was just browned off.

"I can't see them giving up that first goal," he explained. "To blow one like that — two goals, that's something else again."

It is the second time in Civic Arena this season that the Blades have had the Bucks on the ropes, bleeding and battered and ready to go down and stay down. The firs time Bucks fought back from a three goal defecit to earn a draw and settled for that. This time, a brace of goals down and looking like two cents to a millionaire, the Bucks responded to a loosely played Blades game and knotted the contest.

"As long as two or three guys are doing the work, they are happy. They think it is a joke. They really

don't care."
