Blades drop 7th in a row

The Kelowna Buckaroos continued to win at the weekend but the sad part about it as far as the Central City crew was concerned, was that the Penicton Broncos, the team they have to overtake in order to capture the Okanagan Junior Hockey League pennant, did not help their cause any at all, also winning both of their games.

And the Vernon Blades, who no more than seven games ago had made noises to the effect that the circuit flag interested them too, continued to lose.

Friday evening the Bucks belted the Blades 11-1 as the Broncos were withstanding a four goal Kamloops attack in the third period to win 8-5.

And Saturday, Bucks chipped a 6-1 win out of the Kraft Kings as Broncos outlasted the Blades 9-7.

Saturday night the Broncos pounced on goalie Gerry Allen from the outset slapping in four unanswered counters in the first period and causing the Vernon netminder, who has been more than Blueshirts meal ticket all season, to be yanked in lieu of stand-by Dave Ingram, who performed as good as one could ask, for the second time in as many nights. Broncos, however, continued to outscore Blades in the middle session, 3-2, but lost out in the third period spread, 5-2, as locals finally turned on the power.

In one of the sloppiest games played in Civic Arena this season, each team was credited with 34 shots on goal.

Wayne Schaab paced the Penicton scorers with the hat trick while Jim O'Neill and Gene Peacosh turned in two goal performances. Singles were stipped by Ken Connors and Ray Picco.

The sharpshooter in the Vernon camp proved to be Lawrence Quechuck. The fiery winger notched three goals and two assists for a five point night. Scoring a goal each were Ivan Malinosky, Tom Williamson, Jeff Wilson and Tom Serviss.

It was the seventh game in a row that Blades have lost and it leaves them a bit apprehensive about the Kamloops trip and the Kraft Kings scheduled for Wednesday night.

Coach Odie Lowe, who has used Juvenile and Midget age players sparingly in the last few games, expects to be without them for the Kraft Kings engagement. Saturday night Lowe used Wilson, Sam Desimone and Chris Nelson. He is permitted to use the three two more times before the completion of Juvenile playdowns.
