Junior 'B' loop formed in Valley

With the announcement Sunday of the formation of a new Junior "B" league in the Okanagan-Mainline minor hockey organization, Vernon minor officials are taking quick action with practices starting Thursday for all interested players.

Formation of the "B" group that will take in seven areas in the loop, will see six teams formed from Vernon, North Kamloops, Kamloops, Kelowna, Summerland, Revelstoke and Penticton. North Kamloops

and Kamloops will combine a team.

Play is expected to begin about October 15 or soon after when the schedule is drawn up.

Formation of the Junior "B's" has eliminated juvenile play in most centres but is considered a good move because it gives over-age juveniles two more years of play before moving up to the Junior "A" bracket.
