The birth of a Province-wide Junior "A" hockey league, started many months ago, will be finally realized this Sunday when the six team league step on the ice to play their opening games of a 40 game schedule running from Oct. 13 through to March 2.

Many months of planning will be realized when teams from Vernon, Kamloops, Kelowna, Penticton, New Westminster and Victoria take to the ice to perform in the first major Junior league ever properly organized in B.C.

Big things are expected from the league, particularly from the standpoint of professional leagues, who will look to this new group for future players to fill their own ranks.

The "A" loop, governed by a committee of B.C. minor hockey officials, headed by Clem Bird of Penticton will try and maintain a high standard of hockey for all young men graduating from various minor hockey divisions throughout the province.

For Vernon, the hopes of a winner in this new league will ride high on the efforts of several veteran juniors from the old Okanagan league as well as with imports like Dick Marsh, a defenseman from Quesnel and goalie Jack Gilroy from Burnaby. Along with these tried play-

ers, Vernon has an excellent stock of graduating juveniles and other good

hockey players that have grown up with hockey in this area.

Sunday, is the day of the first big test, as the Essos take to the ice against New
