

One loss—two ties

Essos impress crowds at Coast

If nothing else, Vernon Essos proved they are quite a hockey team in the eyes of a good many coast hockey fans following a three game swing from Penticton to Victoria and back to New Westminster in weekend junior "A" hockey action.

Hurting badly from the loss of three key players through injury and a suspension, Vernon Essos didn't let this fact bother them too much as they put on a superb display of top grade hockey that began in Penticton Friday night and ended in New Westminster on Sunday afternoon.

Their 5-1 loss to Penticton tells little for those who did not see the game. Essos kept pace with the powerful Broncos for two and a half periods before they finally ran out of steam in the late stages of the third period to allow Penticton to score three unanswered goals, one of them while Vernon were a man short.

At the coast, the Essos quickly won the hearts of a good many hockey buffs both in Victoria and New Westminster with their fine playmaking as they put on a dazzling display of passing and forechecking in the opposition zones with brilliant defensive tactics by goalie Jack Gilroy and his rear-guard crew.

Playing before 3,488 fans in Victoria, the hustling Vernon squad brought cheers and applause from the large crowd on more than one occasion.

Well aware of the tough schedule ahead of them, the Essos set out to prove if nothing else, that they are contenders in anyone's league.

At Penticton

Although Broncos held a one-goal lead at the end of the first period, the Essos managed to keep pace as they made repeated forays around the net of goalie Bob Belbin who had to make several key saves to keep the determined Vernon boys from scoring.

An early second period goal by Adrain Blais put Broncos ahead 2-0, but Jeff Wilson's rebound shot at the 7:41 mark with Lawrence Quechuk and Keith Rolston in on the play made the Broncos realize the game would be no walk-away.

Both teams fell into a see-saw battle thereafter as each crew made repeated end to end rushes. And it wasn't until at the 11:30 mark of the final period when Vernon were short a man did Penticton manage to forage ahead. Quechuk had been sent off the ice a minute before on an elbowing call when he apparently got too close to the Penticton goalie.

Short-handed with Ivan Malinosky and Ken Pollon out with injuries and the suspension of Tom Williamson, Essos ran out of steam with the Broncos scoring two more goals for the 5-1 win.

Tie Cougars 4-4

Playing in the impressive facilities of the Victoria arena Saturday night, the Essos served notice to the large crowd on hand that

they were going to be hard to beat.

Keith Rolston started things off for the Essos as he teamed with Tom Serviss to open the scoring in the game at 5:25 of the first period.

Essos maintained the lead into the second period, but not before the Cougars themselves had tested Gilroy in the Vernon nets with a massive attack with at least three shots bouncing off corner posts or crossbar.

At 9:16 of the middle period, Cougars' Jim Murdock beat Gilroy with a low shot to even the game, but Rolston came up with his second Vernon marker a little better than three minutes later on a fine play with Serviss and Wilson setting him up at the Cougar blueline. He then went in on the right side and drove a hard shot from 20 feet out that skimmed past Goalie Murray Finlay's left elbow.

Victoria tied the game again late in the period with Vernon a man short. Graham Elliott was sitting out a two minute interference call.

Essos had the tables turned on them in the third period, when Victoria scored two fast mid period goals to take a 4-2 lead.

Thereafter, the game was all Vernon plays as the Essos really put on terrific pressure that finally paid off with less than three minutes to go. Victoria picked up a minor hooking penalty at 17:14 and three seconds later, Bob Mayer drove a screaming slap shot from the blue line that Finlay didn't try to stop.

Fired up, the Essos really swarmed around the Cougars zone following Mayers goal, and with only 37 seconds left in the game, came through with a brilliant tying marker that left the huge crowd stunned.

It was Lawrence Quechuk who scored the goal with Rolston and Serviss again in on the crucial play, but for those dying seconds with everyone banging away around the Cougar net it could have been anyone's game.

Tie Royals 5-5

Sunday afternoon at the Royal city, the story was much the same as New Westminster opened the scoring on two quick first period goals, with Jeff Wilson scoring for Vernon to end that period with Royals leading 2-1.

The second period, both teams scored singles with Royals managing to hold a one goal lead going into the final period.

It was a come-from-behind situation again for Vernon with just five minutes left to play and with Royals leading 5-3. Jerry Vachon's brilliant backhand shot narrowed the scoring with help from Serviss and Perepolkin and then at 17:08 Quechuk tied the game with a smart play from behind the Royals net as he came around from a Rolston-Wilson effort from the corner.
