

Schedule closing out

Playoff teams still in doubt

Vernon Essos found themselves in sole possession of second place in the B.C. junior hockey league after a two game series last weekend, but lady luck must have been looking over their shoulders at the same time.

Friday night, Essos came away from Kelowna suffering a 7-2 drubbing at the hands of the Buckaroos and at Penticton, Broncos were handing Kamloops Rockets a 5-1 shellacking.

Saturday night, Essos played host to New West-

minster Royals and managed to squeeze by with a narrow 9-8 victory, while at Kamloops the Penticton squad were handing the Rockets their second loss in as many nights by a score of 5-4.

Vernon's win moved them two points up on the Rockets in league standings to give them a second place lead.

Going into their three game series, Kelowna moved out of fifth place with a two win one tie effort, to go four points up on New Westminster

Royals.

After their Friday night win at home over Vernon, the Buckaroos travelled to Victoria for Saturday's game and came away with a 3-3 tie, then Sunday afternoon in the Royal city, took good measure of the New Westminster squad with a one-sided 9-4 victory.

All four interior teams have three games remaining in their 40 game regular schedule while both Royals and Cougars have four sessions to go.

The playoff picture still does not look too clear.

Vernon has the best odds going for them at the moment, they have two games at home and one encounter at Victoria. Two games will be played against cellar dwelling Cougars and one against Kelowna. One victory would assure them of at least a playoff spot.

Both Kamloops and Kelowna face a tougher task in their three remaining games. Kelowna must travel twice, once to Vernon and again to Kamloops, while they play their last home game against league-leading Penticton.

Kamloops travel to the coast for a two game sweep against Royals and Cougars and then take on the resurging Kelowna crew at home.

Four points out of fourth place, New Westminster have their backs against the wall in their four remaining games. They travel twice to Penticton to meet the Broncos, play a final game in Victoria and then host Kamloops for their final game of the season on home ice.

The hapless Victoria Cougars, with no chance of getting into the four-

team final playoffs, also have four games remaining. They travel just one more time to Vernon and then play three games at home against Kamloops, New Westminster and Vernon. If nothing else, Cougars could act as spoilers for the other teams in their drive for playoff positions.

Vernon gave Kelowna little trouble Friday night. Although they did manage to keep pace for the first two periods matching single goals in each of the first two periods, they fell apart in the final stanza while Kelowna banged in five unanswered goals, four of them on power plays.

For the most part, Essos exhibited a sloppy style of play throughout the 60 minute encounter, looking very bad particularly in the first two periods.

The final period was a little better, although questionable refereeing may have made the difference on some penalties that resulted on goals from power plays.

There was no doubt from a spectator point of view, Essos were not pulling their weight as a team and

it was obvious certain players did not put everything into it as a unit.

At home Saturday, Essos matched two goals each in the opening period with the visiting Royals, slammed in six goals to three by New Westminster in the middle frame and then fell back for the last 20 minutes to let Royals outscore them three goals to one.

As one bystander said later, another two or three minutes longer in the game and Vernon would have lost.

Lawrence Quechuk paced Vernon to the win with a three goal hat trick with Jeff Wilson and Bob Blanchette scoring two each. Singles came off the sticks of Keith Rolston and Tom Serviss.

Rookie Wayne Dye and Jerry Vachon paced the assists column with three each for one of their better nights.

Next home game for the Essos is Saturday, Feb. 24 when they take on Kelowna and then play host to Victoria the following Wednesday, Feb. 28 before moving to the Capital City for the final game of the season on March 2.

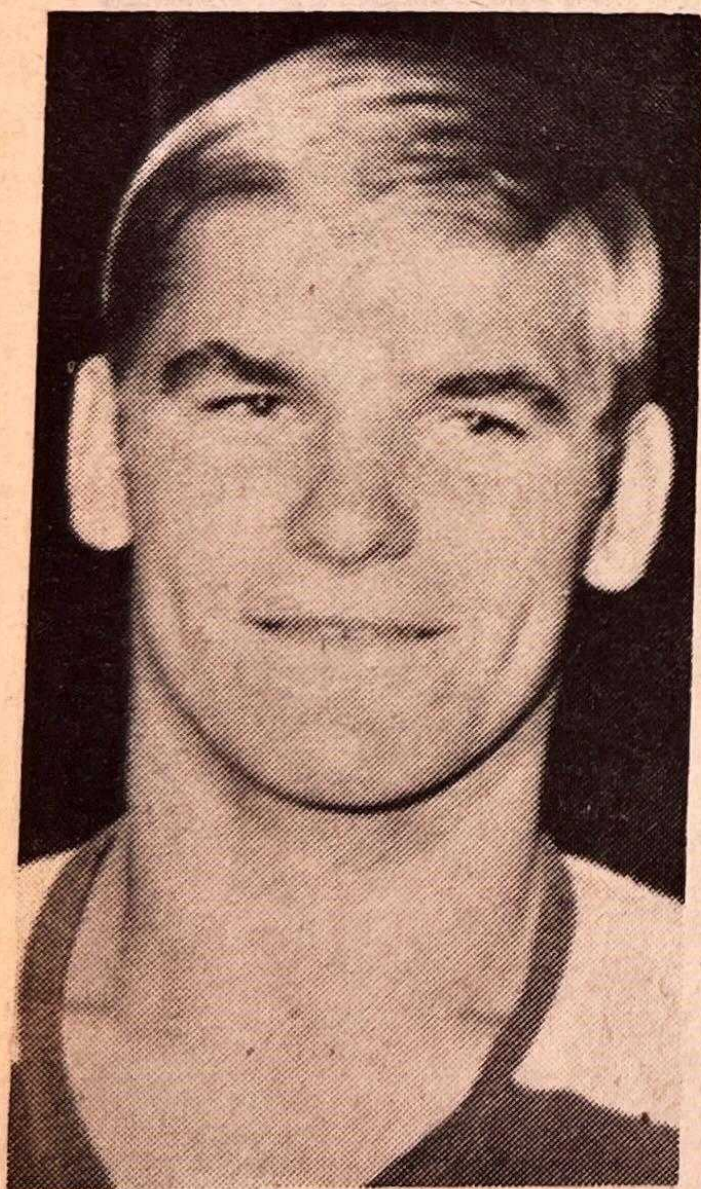
