


Pat Reilly memorial trophy winner

Vernon returns to second

Vernon Essos, playing before more than 1,300 hometown fans, scored a convincing 8-3 victory against Victoria Cougars in B.C. Junior "A" hockey action Wednesday night.

The victory moved Essos once more into a second place tie with Kamloops Rockies. Both clubs now have identical 42 points each.

Vernon still has one game remaining and a win or tie in this game could give them sole possession of second place and the right to meet the fourth place team in the semi-final playoff series.

At the moment Kelowna holds fourth and final spot in the standings but they could be tied next Sunday by New Westminster when the Royal City squad play their final game of the season against the Penticton Broncos in Penticton. If the Royals do win, they would take fourth spot by virtue of their better games won record in their eight game series in regular league action against Kelowna.

In Wednesday's game, both clubs played through a scoreless first period but Vernon came on strong in the early minutes of the second period and before the stanza had finished, were leading 4-0.

Larry Hackman opened the Vernon scoring on one of the best one-man efforts seen this year. He stole the puck off of a Cougar player at centre ice, worked his way down past three Victoria defenders and drove a hard slap shot from 15 feet out that went by the short side of Murray Findlay in the net for the visiting club. This goal came at 1:14.

Several more Vernon drives almost found their mark but Findlay was up to his usual standard of proficiency and managed to hold off until just over the 14 minute mark when Jeff Wilson scored the first of his three-goal effort of the game.

Malinoski scored goal number three less than minutes later and then scored his second goal at the 16 minute mark to end the scoring in the period.

With only 17 seconds showing on the clock Cougars' Terry Mitchell put Victoria on the score sheet just at the start of the third period play. Vernon came back on a single effort by Keith Rolston and another by Jeff Wilson, his second of the evening. Victoria's goal number two was scored by Larry Limacher but Wayne Dye nullified this one with a good effort from a scramble in front of the net.

Victoria's final goal and

the second for Mitchell came late in the period with a return reply by the Essos when Jeff Wilson went in alone to beat Findlay and to end the game scoring with Vernon well out in front.

Both net minders were always on top of the play, particularly Findlay of the Cougars. He was called upon to save 19 shots in the first period; 16 in the second and 13 in the final frame for a total of 48 saves for an excellent

night's work. Gilroy for Vernon was equally good as he pushed aside 31 drives. In penalties Vernon was tops picking up six minors as compared to three by Victoria.


The playoff picture will probably start a week from this Saturday and will be a best of five series with first place Penticton taking on the third place finishers and the second place team meeting the fourth place squad.
