Essos manager feeling pinch

Vernon Junior Essos team manager Vern Dye has expressed deep concern over the fact that no news had been received on whether four of the team's imports have been accepted for classes at two Okanagan Senior Secondary schools.

Dye told The Vernon News that if word was not received in the immediate future the four lads in question would pack up and go home.

The boys — Dick Marsh, Jack Marsh, Lawrence Quichuck and Dawson Waite—were originally refused admission to the Vernon school system on the grounds they were not residents of the area.

F. L. Irwin, district superintendent of School District 22, said today that the case of Dawson Waite is still under consideration for the Vernon school.

In a phone conversation with the Armstrong School Board office, The Vernon News was told that a let-

ter had been sent to the Essos president, but no details were released.

Essos manager Vern Dye said, "If these boys have to leave because of inadequate school facilities in the area it will tear the whole backbone out of the team."

Team president Dave MacKay stated that he had received no word to confirm or reject the applications of the lads to the Armstrong school system.
