Loss, win, loss for trailing Jr. Essos

The on again-off again Vernon Essos of the British Columbia Junior Hockey League made it a loss, a win, and a loss in three encounters against stiff opposition over the weekend.

The Essos, now in sole possession of the bottom rung of the BCJHL standings lost to a powerful Penticton squad on Friday night.

At the same time, Friday night fans could see that it was a new and powerful Essos squad that was on the ice. There was no fool-

ing around once they had the puck in their possession. They were a club that was well organized, they seemed to know what to do, and they did it. However, it just wasn't enough to stop the powerful Bronco's from a 5-4 victory.

Penticton opened the scoring in the first period with goals by Laughton and Conner at 10:44 and 14:58. Vernon came back with one answering tally at 17:21 off the stick of winger Jack Marsh. The period ended with the Essos trailing by a score of 2-1.

At the opening face-off of the second period, Wayne Dye dropped a pass back to Dick Marsh, who slipped it ahead to Jack Marsh. All it took was a flick of the wrist, and Marsh was in for his second goal of the evening.

At the 1:14 mark, Lawrence Quechuck made a one-man attack on the Penticton goal, and was successful in giving the Essos the lead for the first time in the game.

At 2:22, it was Bill Tarnow who connected with a blistering shot on a pass from Gerry Vachon to move the Essos to a 4-2 lead.

From then on, both teams stayed at the same level with good passing, and checking for the remainder of the second period.

With the third period barely underway, Ken Conner of the Penticton Broncos found a hole in the Vernon defence and pushed one past Gilroy to bring the score to 4-3 in favor of the Essos.

The tying goal came at the eight minute mark when Penticton's Ed Hayes scored on a beautiful passing play.

With the score all tied up, both teams started to dig in with renewed vigor. At 18:18, Reg Cherenko took a pass from Tom Madden and made no mistake on his shot on goal. The final score, Penticton 5, Vernon 4.

The game was relatively Penalty free, with none of the rough-house tactics prevalent in other games. The only major penalty of the game was a 5 minute effort picked up by Wayne Dye for supposedly using the butt-end of his stick on a Penticton player.

Saturday's encounter in Penticton was a horse of a different color as the Essos went all out and trimmed the Broncos by a resounding 8-4.

Gerry Vachon was the big gun for the Essos picking up an unbelievable five goals throughout the game.

Lawrence Quechuck, Rick Monk, and Wayne Dye each picked up singles in the encounter which was played before approximately 1200 Penticton fans.

Vernon led 3-1 at the end of the first period; 4-2 at the end of the second; and

came out of the third with a grand 8-4 victory.

Only 10 penalties were handed out in the game that saw plenty of stiff checking, but still a definite absence of the rough-house encounters between Kelowna and Vernon during the previous weekend.

Madden, Hayes, Laughton, and Conner scored for the Penticton Broncos.

Kamloops 7, Vernon 2

A scant 12 hours after returning home from a victory in Penticton, the Vernon Essos laced on their skates and went all out against the Kamloops Rockets in a Sunday afternoon encounter.

It was a sad day for the tired Essos, as play after play was broken by a powerful Kamloops defence.

The Essos fired 34 shots at the Kamloops goalie, but few had the power and snap needed to score.

On the other hand, the Kamloops forward line were able to slip by the Vernon defense on several

occasions and put the puck past Al Alexander in the Vernon nets.

Newcomer Gary Burlingame opened the scoring at the 6:27 mark on a pass from Rick Monk, to give the Essos an early 1-0 lead.

Kamloops team captain, Marv Ferg came back unassisted at 9:52 to put the Rockets on the board and tie the game at 1-1.

At 9:58, just 6 seconds later, Wayne Dye grabbed his opportunity on a pass from Jack Marsh and Lawrence Quechuck. It was the last time that the Essos would hold the lead in the game.

At 13:58 and 15:44 of the first period, Stanley and

Johnson each scored to give the Rockets a 3-2 edge.

In the second period, Vernon held Kamloops at bay until 16:51 when Stanley scored to make it 4-2. And the Rockets scored again at 19:57 when Larry Stocks beat Alexander on a wide-open shot.

Kamloops coasted home to victory during the third period, scoring at 8:10 and again at 12:57 to make the final tally 7-2 in favor of the Kamloops Rockets.

Vernon travels to Kamloops Wednesday night to vie once again with the Rockets. Then, on the weekend, the Essos will make their first Coast trip of the season to tangle with Victoria on Saturday and New Westminster on Sunday. Next home game for the Essos will be on Wednesday Nov. 6 when they will once again host the Penticton Broncos.

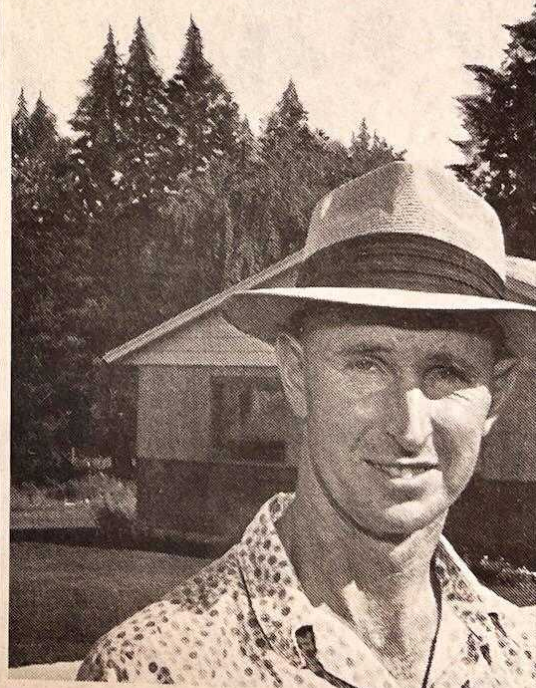
