Tomorrow night at the Vernon Civic Arena, the high-flying Vernon Essos will take on the Kelowna Buckaroos at 8:30.




## Six unanswered goals

In the past, I've made some rather snide remarks about the officiating of Vernon referee Ernie Poggemiller, but after Friday night's hockey game in Penticton, I take it all back.

We've seen Ernie make some pretty bad calls, but at least he's fair about the whole thing. When he clamps down on a game he at least makes the calls both ways.

Of the officiating I've observed in the four valley centres, Poggemiller will have to be awarded the "B" for best.

Kamloops has fair quality referees, while Kelowna's officiating leaves much to be desired.

However, the big "D" for dismal just has to go to referee Red Bosscko of Penticton.

When a referee can call so one-sidedly that the home team gets two minutes in penalty time, while the visitors pick up 64 minutes

including a game misconduct, there's obviously a blind eye being turned somewhere.

The Penticton linesmen were almost as bad missing numerous off-side calls, and attempting to make face-offs at the wrong end of the ice.

The question is, how do these fellows manage to get a ticket to officiate at any level of hockey? Refereeing is a thankless job to begin with, but officiating like that demonstrated by Bosscko only makes things worse for every ref in the league.

The Penticton referees and linesmen also have a policy of not interfering when two players get into a fight.

A striking example of this was demonstrated on Friday when Ed Hays of Penticton jumped on the back of Vernon's Bill Tarnow. Now, a good fight now and then certainly spices up a hockey game; but a policy of "let 'em go to it" isn't always appreciated by the player who is attacked.

In this case, Tarnow was attacked from behind, but no effort was made to stop Hays from doing any damage. However, Tarnow proved to be the better scrapper and dumped the Bronco player soundly on the ice. Then, and only then, did the referee and linesmen move in and pin Tarnow to the ice before giving him a five-minute penalty for fighting.

When questioned by Assistant Captain Lawrence Quechuck "why didn't you break up the fight sooner?", Referee Bossacko replied "your man started it so why should we get in on it."

At least you don't see the Vernon referee and linesmen letting a fight get out of hand. They move in quickly and get it stopped before anyone else can join in the melee.

## In man-made channel

## Kokanee spawn successfully

In tens of thousands, four-year-old kokanee again are schooling in the man-made spawning channel built by B.C. Hydro at Meadow Creek, a tributary of the Duncan River, the channel was completed by late summer of '67, in ample time for the fall spawning run.

By mid-October, at about the peak of the run, more than 150,000 of the redfish were estimated to have passed through the lower gates and into the channel.

Fish and Wildlife Branch researchers estimated that last year, its first year in operation, more than 200,000 kokanee spawned into the artificial channel, with the kokanee equally divided as to male and female. The 100,000 female fish deposited 30,000,000 eggs in the gravel spawning beds that line the channel.

ing beds in the Duncan River, blocked by construction of the Duncan Dam. Located west of the dam site on Meadow Creek, a tributary of the Duncan River, the channel was completed by late summer of '67, in ample time for the fall spawning run.

In other dam site activity, about 90 per cent of the reservoir area behind the Arrow Dam already has been cleared and work on the remainder will continue through the winter months as long as weather permits.

Of the 2,500 acres remaining to be cleared, about one-third are located in the Nakusp area and most of the remainder between Revelstoke and Arrowhead.
