

Juniors defeat Kamloops Rockets

More than 800 fans filed into the Vernon Arena Friday night to watch the Vernon Essos play host to the Kamloops Rockets. For the first two periods they sat wondering why they had ever wasted the money to attend.

The Essos were down by a score of 4-0 as they skated on the ice to begin the third period. Then, the Miracle Workers did it again. A third period rally for six unanswered goals

gave the Essos a victory that minutes before had seemed a certainty for the visitors.

The Rockets, playing better than they had ever stacked up against the Essos before, scored two goals in the first period off the sticks of Grant Williams and Gordon Redding.

Had it not been for the fantastic performance of John Bade in the Kamloops nets, the game would have been over for the Rockets in the first period. Bade blocked a total of 23 shots during the first frame and held back every Vernon attack. By the time the game was completed, Bade had turned aside 43 Eso attempts.

In the second period, play was confined to the centre ice area. However, Larry Simon and Stephen Sanders did manage to break through the Vernon defence and pick up two more tallies.

Then in the third period, the Essos pulled all the stops and out-played, out-shot, and outskated the tiring visitors.

It was a big evening for Wayne Dye who pulled off three goals in seven minutes.

Dye connected at 1:12 of the third to give the Essos their first score of the game. The goal had come on a pass from the point, manned by Bob Craig.

With the ice broken, the Essos went all out to score more goals. The next man to beat Bade in the Kamloops net was Bob Blanchette who scored unassisted at 2:08.

At 3:49 Gerry Vachon slapped a pass in front of the Kamloops goal. Wayne Dye, who had been waiting in the "slot" position rushed the puck and tipped it into the Kamloops net with the greatest of ease.

At the eight minute mark of the third, the line of Dye, Quechuck, and Blanchette returned to the ice with

every fan screaming "Go Vernon, go... go Vernon, go." And "Go" is exactly what they did. Wayne Dye picked up his third goal of the evening at 8:14 on a pass from Lawrence Quechuck. The score was tied 4-4.

As is only fitting when a team pulls a surprise come-back over stiff opposition, a defenceman scored what proved to be the winning goal for the Essos. In attempting to set up a scoring play, Gerry Vachon found himself hemmed in along the boards by two Kamloops defenders. He made a quick flip pass out to Bob Craig who made no mistake in his attempt to get it past Bade. The Essos had come to the front, 5-4.

Not satisfied with a one-goal advantage, the Essos kept up the pressure until Pat Becotte scored at 12:30 on a pass from Jack Marsh.

For the remainder of the game, the Essos maintained their 6-4 lead by using solid defensive tactics.


At 16:04, Rockets forward, Larry Mori joined the growing list of BCJHL players who have found that it doesn't pay to throw down their gloves and stick to take a punch at Eso defenceman Bob Craig. As is the usual result of such an encounter, Mori was retired to the penalty box, bleeding from the nose and mouth.

The five-minute majors handed out to Craig and Mori were surprisingly the only such incidents of the game which featured tough tight checking throughout.


Bade in the Kamloops nets blocked 43 Vernon shots, while Al Alexander was required to handle 24.

The fans had entered the


