### Ski Tips

#### CARING FOR BOOTS

Ski boots demand special treatment. After spending so much money on boots, you should know how to look after them to get the best service. Good boots can be easily ruined. They must be kept completely waterproof but do not use a wax or polish that contains oil, grease or dubbin. This softens the leathers, and too pliable a leather does not give you the necessary control. After all, this is the reason you buy stiff expensive boots.

For best results, use a silicone type of waterproofing first. Then polish the boots with ordinary shoe polish each morning that they will be used. This is important! Don't polish them when they are wet. A touch of shellac on the stitching and around the edge of the sole can be used for added protection. However, these parts should be polished with the rest of the boot.


Whenever possible, avoid using your ski boots when walking, especially on pavement . . . this can wear down the heels and bend the soles. Good ski boots are not designed for walking. And, always keep your boots in a press when they're not in use.

NEVER dry them close to a fire or stove as good leather can be ruined this way. Boots can give comfort, safety and fun on the slopes, so treat them properly when you are at home.

Proper lacing is an important factor to comfort and ski control, so it is worth taking a few minutes extra in fastening your footwear.

First, the inner boot should be laced loosely over the toes, firmly over the arch and instep, and tightly around the ankles. When this is done, the foot should fit firmly in the boot, with room to move the toes. The heel should not be able to lift off the sole of the boot when you step forward.

The outer boot, which should be stiff is laced evenly with a little more tightness around the

right through to the finals last year before being dumped by Penticton. At that time, the Broncos picked up Watson for their Western Canada playoffs against the Estevan Bruins.

No lacing should be so tight as to cut off circulation. Your boots should be comfortable with no cramping of the foot. It's a good idea with new boots to leave the top two eyelets undone until the boot is broken in. This will enable you to get the forward ankle bend you need without hurting the front of your ankle.

I guess the ultimate answer is to buy good plastic buckle boots. They don't need polish of any sort, are completely waterproof and do not require a boot press. The buckles of course make lacing obsolete. They're the latest thing. If your budget will allow, costing approximately \$150 and up!

## Victoria steals win in Friday contest

A crowd of 950 fans left the Vernon Arena Friday night feeling that they had somehow been robbed. The hometown boys, and the favorites in the BCJHL action, dropped a narrow 5-4 decision to the Victoria Cougars.

The Essos took the lead, after a scoreless first period, at 3:19 of the second, when Bob Blanchette scored on a pass from Dick Marsh.

It was a short-lived lead however as the Cougars came back to tie the score at 6:58 as Laurie Moore tipped the puck into the net on a pass from Doug Gibson.

At 13:35 Victoria took the lead as Scott Munro scored on a blistering slap shot from 20 feet out.

Lawrence Quechuck made the score 2-2 when he took a pass from Bob Mayer at the point and made no mistake in slipping it past Ed Forslund in the Victoria nets, at 13:52.

In a flurry of action, the Cougars made a return trip into Essos territory and picked up a 3-2 lead at 14:20 when Len Barry scored on a play set up by Bruce Cowick and Grant Evans.

Wayne Dye led a rush on the Victoria net to score at 15:58 on a pass from Jack Marsh. The score was tied 3-3.

When the teams returned to the ice for the final 20 minutes of action, they finally appeared to be ready to play serious hockey. No penalties were assessed in the final frame and both teams engaged in tight clean checking.

Victoria jumped into a 4-3 lead at 2:28 as Laurie Moore scored from Cowick and Evans. At 11:10, the Cougars stretched their margin to 5-3 when Len Barry scored on a pass from Grant Evans.

In an attempt to balance the score, the Essos repeated the rush to the Cougars net, but couldn't beat the fantastic performance of Ed Forslund. At 15:02, Wayne Dye picked up Vernon's fourth and final tally of the game when he scored unassisted.

The final score, Victoria 5, Vernon 4.

Referee Ernie Poggemiller handed out a total of 59 minutes in penalties during the first 40 minutes of action. The game was completely out of control during the first period which saw as many as three men from each side sitting in the sin-bin at the same time.

Victoria's Len Barry threw down the gloves and started swinging at Esso defenceman Dick Marsh at 5:05 of the first period. However, he never succeeded in landing a blow before Marsh was able to grab him and hang on. Seeing that no real damage had been done, referee Poggemiller sent each man to the penalty box on a two plus two penalty for rough-

ing and interference.

At 5:58 Victoria's John Van Horlick and Bob Mayer scored on a pass from Dick Marsh.

of the Essos tangled in what looked like it was about to develop into a team brawl. However, linesmen Russ Kingley and Rick Riley soon established law and order and both offending players were given five minute fighting sentences.

Victoria's Scott Munro received the only 10-minute misconduct penalty of the

game at 12:38 of the first period.

At 5:03 of the second period, Barry decided to try his boxing style once again this time, with Bob Craig who has no patience with anyone who wants to fight on the ice. Craig dropped Barry with a left hook that would make George Chuvalo proud. Both men were given five minute fighting penalties, however, Craig came out on the "short-end of the stick" when he was also given two minutes for interfer-

ence. Both penalty boxes were so full that when Wayne Dye was given a delayed penalty for unnecessary roughing at 6:28 of the second, he had to wait in the box until 11:28 before he could begin to serve the time.

By the time the game had ended, Al Alexander in the Vernon nets had blocked a total of 30 shots, while Ed Forslund had stopped 39 for Victoria. Both net-minders turned in star performances throughout the entire 60 minutes of action.

Just 13 seconds later, the Royals were back to tie the score from the stick of Kevin Coates.



The Royals picked up the lead for the first time in the game at 19:10 of the first period when Mick Wilson scored on Vernon's Jack Gilroy.


