Vernon dumps Kelowna 5-3

The Vernon Essos maintained their hold on second place Saturday night with a 5-3 victory over the Kelowna Buckaroos.

The game was played in the Vernon Civic Arena before 1,200 fans who really got their money's worth as Vernon took a 3-1 edge in the first period, held on to a 3-2 lead in the second and moved on to gain the victory with two more goals in the third period.

The game opened up quickly for the Essos as they pressed the advantage from the opening face-off and succeeded in beating Ron Pyle in the Kelowna nets at 5:05 and 5:20 of the first period. The first goal was scored by high-flying Vernon ace Wayne Dye with Bob Craig picking up the assist.

Don Manson picked up a well deserved point when he scored the second goal with the assist being awarded to Wayne Dye.

At 14:59, the Kelowna Buckaroos hit the scoreboard for the first time as Gene Carr scored from Ken Phillip.

Lawrence Quechuck rounded out the first period scoring at 18:10 when he knocked home a pass from Gerry Vachon.

The second period action became tight when Gene Carr poked home his second goal of the evening at

3:55.

The goal judge declared that the puck had hit the inside of the goal post before bouncing back out. Vernon goaltender Al Alexander claimed that the puck had never crossed the line into the goal at all and backed up his actions by spearing the goal judge with the butt end of his stick. For this Alexander was given a 10 minute misconduct penalty which was served by forward Jack Marsh.

That ended the scoring in the second period but set the stage for some rugged action that saw body checks flying thick and fast on both sides.

The Buckaroos came on strong in the first few minutes of the third period and even managed to tie the score 3-3 at the 56-second mark.

However at 1:16 Gerry Gachon went all the way for the Essos and regained the lead with an unassisted goal.

Wayne Dye picked up his second goal of the night just four minutes later as he slammed home the final 5-3 score at 5:15.

Besides Alexander's 10-minute misconduct, Referee Poggemiller also handed out a 10 minute stint to Kelowna's Pat MacMahon for disputing too long and too loud a penalty called against one of his teammates.

In gaining the win, Al Alexander of Vernon blocked 41 shots while loser Ron Pyle also did a full nights work in handling 43 Vernon attempts.

The Essos now have a full two-week rest period before travelling to Penticton for the first game of a home-and-home series on Feb. 15.

The second game in the series will be played in Vernon on Sunday, Feb. 16 at 8 p.m. and is expected to draw a full house from the Winter Carnival visitors.
