

Buckaroos stay alive with overtime victory

KELOWNA, B.C. (CP) — Murray Hanson scored on a disputed play at 25 seconds of sudden-death overtime Sunday night to give Kelowna Buckaroos a 5-4 win over Selkirk Steelers and keep the Buckaroos alive in their Centennial Cup junior hockey semi-final.

Selkirk leads the best-of-seven series 3-2 with the sixth game scheduled here Tuesday night. Selkirk downed Kelowna 8-3 on Saturday.

Archie McKinnon scored twice Sunday for Kelowna, while singles came from Duane Monteith and Mark Lofthouse, who forced overtime with his marker at 18:09 of the third period.

The clubs played 10 minutes of scoreless overtime before beginning the short-lived suddendeath session.

Steeler goals were by Murray Thomson, Bill Whitehead, Jerry Dudar and Gord Kaluzniak.

On Saturday, Gary Kaluzniak and Marlin Vanrobaeys led the Steelers with two goals each, while Rick Klassen, Howie Parks, Thomson and Gord Kaluzniak added singles.

Lofthouse scored twice for Kelowna, Monteith once.

The winning goal Sunday came as Dale Costanzo dug the puck out from behind the Selkirk net and passed in front

where Hanson shot it in from the crease.

The play followed a breakaway by Archie McKinnon of the Buckaroos that was stopped by Selkirk goaltender Andy Stoesz with the puck going back of the goal.

Coach George Dorman of the Steelers insisted after the game that McKinnon's breakaway resulted from an offside pass.

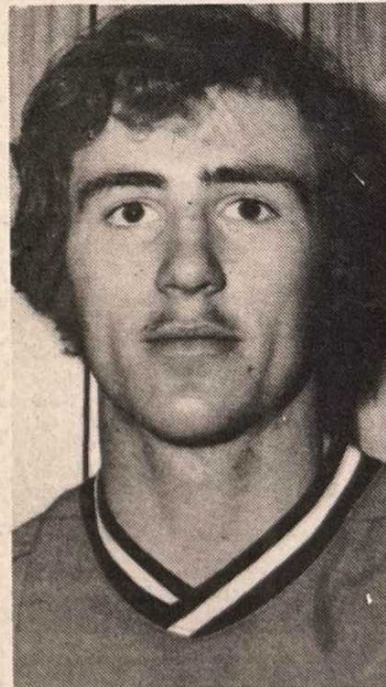
