Nothing definite on Vikings sale

Vernon Vikings General Manager Vern Dye told the Daily News Friday nothing has been confirmed on the proposed sale of the Vikings.

Several parties have expressed interest in buying the club, including at least two local groups and Calgary Centennials owner Scotty Munro. A price tag of \$50,000 has been put on the team.

Dye said, "We hope to have the situation settled early next week."

Meanwhile, in Kelowna, B.C. Junior Hockey League President Arnold Lowden has announced the league is planning to publish a yearbook for the 1974-75 season.

The yearbook will include a complete history of the league, which first began operations as the Okanagan Junior Hockey League during the 1961-62 season. As well as a league history, Lowden said the yearbook will also feature an extensive section on all-time league records.

"It's designed as an information package to bring any hockey fan up to date quickly on the past years of the BCJHL," said Lowden.

Describing the yearbook as an ambitious project, Lowden said, "It's another in a series of steps to make the BCJHL a first class operation."

Editor of the yearbook will be Bryan Couling, who has

resigned as sports director of CKIQ Radio, in Kelowna, so he may devote his time to the yearbook.

The league hopes to make the yearbook available for sale early in the fall. There are currently more than 20 former BCJHL players in either the NHL or WHA.
