Spokane's future still up in the air

Future of the Spokane Jets entry in the B.C. Junior Hockey League is looking a little brighter today than it did last week.

Jets were refused admission to the BCJHL, two weeks ago by the B.C. Amateur Hockey Association when a charge of tampering with players was levied by the Manitoba Amateur Hockey Association.

However, both the MAHA and the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association are now satisfied that Spokane has returned all of the Manitoba players.

BCAHA president Frank Spring, of Cranbrook, has received a telegram from the CAHA forgiving Spokane for the tampering. He is now awaiting a similar telegram to reconsider the Jets' application.

BCJHL president Brian Couling said this is Spokane's last chance and the league can wait for a final decision for only a few more days.

Couling said, "We are opening the league schedule without Spokane. A scheduled game between Spokane and Kelowna Saturday, has been postponed. If no decision is

HELONKI (CP) — Play may get rough at times, but Gordie Howe predicts there'll be no fistfights during the eight-game international hockey series between Team Canada and the Soviet Union.

Buckaroos record exhibition victory

Defending B.C. Junior Hockey League champions Kelowna Buckaroos ended their pre-season schedule Wednesday with a 5-3 win over Vernon Vikings, before 325 fans at the Vernon Civic Arena.

A pair of brothers from Burnaby, acquired this summer by Kelowna, did most of the damage.

Perry Schnaar picked up a second period hat trick, while brother Mark, scored once and added two assists.

Bill Haynes opened the scoring for Kelowna at the 5:59 mark of the first period while Vernon was playing a man short.

At 11:45, Mark Schnaar made the score 2-0 when he went in alone on Viking goalie Jim Scammel, gave the netminder a fake, and drib-

bled the shot into the net behind him.

Perry Schnaar made the score 3-0 in the opening minute of the second period, but only seconds later, at 1:09 Grand Sidnick banged in a rebound for the Vikings to make the score 3-1.

Sidnick's linemates, Marty Stein and Darrell Billsten, both had shots on goal, before Sidnick was able to bang the puck in.

Veteran Dave Caldwell made the score 3-2 with a picture goal at 2:52. He was set up beautifully by winger Brad Schultz and defenceman Terry Anaka.

However, Perry Schnaar gave Kelowna a 5-2 lead before the second period ended with a pair of power play goals.

Billsten rounded out the scoring at 19:39 of the third period when he scored from Owen Lloyd and Stein.

Kelowna goalie Jerry Nekrasoff blocked 43 Vernon

shots, while goalies Darrell Furmanek, Keith Ferner, and Scammel, who each played one period, made a total of 19 stops.

Scammel allowed the two first period goals, Ferner was beaten three times in the second period, and Furmanek blanked the Bucks in the third.

However, it was not the goaltending which beat Vernon. Kelowna did not play a particularly good game, but Vikings came up with an extremely lacklustre effort.

Particularly the defence, which was supposed to be considerably stronger than last year, looked terrible, leaving the netminders alone against the Kelowna forwards time-after-time.

Best forward line for Vernon, if you had to pick one, was probably the Billsten, Stein, Sidnick unit. Sidnick appeared to be one of the few Vikings' giving it 100 per cent.

Vikings' regular schedule opens Saturday at home, when they host Langley Lords.
