Vernon schools eliminated

Clarence Fulton girls' team and W.L. Seaton boys' team were both eliminated in the semi-finals of the Okanagan Junior Secondary School volleyball championships over the weekend.

Fulton girls, playing in their home gymnasium, were defeated by McNicoll Park, of Penticton, 14-16, 15-5, and 15-1 in the semi-finals.

McArthur Park, of Kamloops, won the championship, for the fifth straight year, defeating McNicoll Park 15-9 and 15-10 in the finals.

In Penticton, Seaton boys were trounced 15-4 and 15-5 by Princess Margaret, of Penticton, in the semi-finals.

Dr. Knox, of Kelowna, defeated Princess Margaret in the finals.

Mike Kormas was the only Seaton player named to the all-star squad.

VSSS teams earn spots in provincial tourney

Vernon Senior Secondary School's boys and girls volleyball teams have earned berths in the provincial finals.

In Kelowna Saturday, the Vernon boys, previously undefeated this season, were beaten by defending B.C. champion Revelstoke, two games to one in the final series of the Okanagan championships.

However, VSSS and Revelstoke, along with Kamloops, who placed third in the tourney, now advance to the B.C. finals Dec. 5 to 7, in Victoria.

Vernon placed first in round-robin play defeating Oliver 15-6 and 15-11, splitting with Kamloops 15-6, and 11-15, and sweeping Winfield 15-3 and 15-9.

VSSS met Penticton in the semi-finals and had little trouble disposing of the Peach City team, 15-3 and 15-9.

Revelstoke proved to be much tougher than they have shown during north zone league play this year. Vernon won the opening game 15-9 but then lost the next two, 15-9 and 15-6.

Vernon girls, playing in North Kamloops Saturday, also placed second in the Okanagan championships.

The Vernon girls placed first in round-robin action as they trounced Oliver 15-4 twice, edged Rutland 15-6 and 15-13, and split with North Kamloops 3-15 and 16-14.

For Vikings, it was their fifth game in as many days and they almost pulled it out of the fire.

Vernon came out in the first period flat, and as a result, trailed 4-1 after 20 minutes.

Kelly Ferner, with two, Ryan Walter and Dwayne Lowdermilk gave Lords the early lead, Grant Sidnick replied for Vernon.

Vikings narrowed the gap to 5-3 after the second period on goals by Randy McDonald and Brad Schultz. Terry Tarnow scored for Langley.

Centre Bill Ranson scored at 11 of the third period to make the score 5-4. But despite pulling goalie Darrel Furmanek in the final minute, Vikings could not tie the score.

The winning goal by Tarnow resulted in a heated dispute and a move seldom seen in hockey.

FROZEN PLAY

Tarnow's shot, on a power play, got behind Furmanek and was nearing, or on, the goal line when stopped by a Vernon defender. Referee Jim Adrian immediately signalled a goal but the red light was not on.

Adrian refused to consult the goal judge and Vernon defenceman Brian Griese was

handed a 10-minute misconduct for arguing too strenuously. As the puck was faced-off after the goal, Vikings simply stood in their positions and watched the Lords go in alone on Furmanek. The Vernon goalie made the save and Adrian told Vernon coach Joe Tennant he was making a mockery of the game.

Tennant had some choice words for Adrian and was then ejected from the game.

DOWNED BLAZERS

Vikings defeated Bellingham Blazers 4-1, before 1478 fans.

Vernon beat Blazers in every aspect of the game including scoring, hitting and fighting.

Captain Greg Wamsley, emerging as the Vikings' leader, won two decisions over Bellingham opponents in fisticuffs and took time out to score one goal and add two assists.

Linemates Gary Gilchrist and Ron Areshneko, along with Dwight Bailey, got the other Vernon goals.

Tennant said today, "Any time a team can come up with the kind of effort our club has during the past week, there is something to be proud of."

Vikings are now off until Thursday when they travel to Merritt to meet the Centennials.

British Columbia Junior A Hockey League will be applying to the B.C. Amateur Hockey Association, in December, for tier one status for the 1975-76 hockey season.

Bryan Couling, president of the BCJHL, currently a tier two league, told the Daily News this morning that the league will make a presentation at the BCAHA's semi-annual meeting Dec. 5 to 7, in Vancouver.

Couling said, "We are making the move because of huge increase in minor hockey registration in B.C. during the past few years. We can see no reason why players should have to leave the province to play tier one hockey."

"The BCJHL feels it will be able to provide them with a place to play in their own province."

There are currently eight franchisees operating in the BCJHL, including Vernon Vikings. Couling said he would be surprised if eight teams went to tier one. He said, "Probably only six teams will move up."
