## Where oh where will Bucks play?

The future of Kelowna Buckaroos appears to be up in the air.

Kelowna Civic Workers' strike continues to drag on and Bucks still have no place to play their home games, one month after the B.C. Junior Hockey League season opened.

BCJHL President Bryan Couling said last week some action must be taken, by the Bucks, if the strike is not over by Nov. 1.

As the date approaches, the club has not yet given any firm indication of its plans.

The Bucks' management has asked Kelowna Council to open the arena with supervisory personnel. However, they have received no commitment from council.

### TWO CHOICES

The only other alternatives for the current Interior Division leaders appear to be, to move, or fold.

Revelstoke, and at least two other Interior cities, have expressed an interest in housing the Bucks for the remainder of the season. But, there is some speculation that the Bucks would rather fold than switch.

To date, Kelowna has played three home games in Penticton, and this Sunday, they will use the new Enderby

Arena to host Nanaimo Clippers.

Meanwhile, in league action Wednesday, Nanaimo hammered Maple Ridge Blazers 8-3.

Geordie Robertson paced the Clippers with two goals while Dale Ewasiuk, Gary Lupul, George Fritz, Pat Graisiger, John Gordon, and Mickey Willgress added singles.

Scoring for Maple Ridge were Cam Stratchuk, George Phillipoff, and Rob Anderson.

Vernon Vikings have two home games this weekend. Friday night they host Nanaimo and on Saturday, the Bucks are in town.
