## Lords win first on Interior swing

Del Parker scored two goals to lead Langley Lords to a 4-1 victory over Penticton Vees in the only B.C. Junior Hockey League game Friday.

More than 1,100 fans were on hand for the game in Penticton.

Bob Jones and Mark Taylor scored the other Langley goals while Rod Pacholzuk replied for the Vees.

The teams were tied 1-1 at the end of the first period but Langley moved into a 2-1 lead by the end of the second.

Langley's Al Weibe blocked 28 shots while Vees' Dennis Ewanchuk turned away 23. Penticton was assessed six of 10 minor penalties.

Vernon Vikings host the Lords tonight while Kelowna Buckaroos travel to Chilliwack to take on the Bruins.

## Strangers meet Sunday in eastern semi-final

MONTREAL (CP) — When Hamilton Tiger-Cats meet Montreal Alouettes in the Eastern Football Conference sudden-death semi-final Sunday, it will mark the first time in almost three months the clubs have faced each other.

Because of the vagaries of this season's Canadian Football League schedule, the Ticats and the Alouettes had their three regular-season meetings out of the way by Aug. 19.

Therefore neither coach Jerry Williams of Hamilton nor Marv Levy of Montreal will rely too heavily on what happened in the early season to establish a game plan for Sunday.

While Montreal will have virtually the same lineup it used against Hamilton during the regular schedule, the Ticats' roster has undergone

since the Cats skinned into the semi-final with a season-ending 26-10 victory against Toronto Argonauts last Saturday will be the insertion of utility lineman Ted Hand in place of defensive end Mark Chalmers. Chalmers was cut Thursday night.

As far as the Alouettes are concerned they are faced with the possibility of meeting Hamilton with only 31 players instead of the normal 32-man roster.
