# Vikings dump Pentiction

Vernon Vikings Wednesday won their seventh consecutive game with an 11-3 victory over the Pentiction Vees, but were unable to increase their hold on first place in the Interior Division of the B.C. Junior Hockey League.

Vikings have 26 points, two more than Kelowna Buckaroos, who defeated Merritt Centennials 8-4 in Merritt. In the only other Wednesday BCJHL contest, Nanaimo Clippers nipped Chilliwack Bruins 5-4 in overtime.

The Vernon squad led from the start of the game, building up a 3-0 lead in the first period and a 7-2 lead in the second.

The Vikings got on the scoreboard when Jack Lefley slipped the puck past Pentiction netminder Dennis Ewanchuk during a jam-up at the Vees net.

Clyde Goodswimmer scored two quick goals — including one on a power play — to increase the Vikings lead to 3-0.

In the second period, Ken Stroud and Peter Poeschek scored for the Vikings before Dwight Bailey scored an unassisted goal through a maze of players at the Vernon net midway through the second period to make it 5-1.

Darrell Billsten and Darcy Wilkinson scored to round out the Vernon scoring action in the period.

Ron Feenie made it 7-2 for the Vees by slipping the puck between Vernon goaltender Keith Ferner near the end of the period.

Gary Huth, Lefley, Drew Tumback, and Brian Griese scored for the Vikings in the third period, while Ron McDowell scored for the Vees.

The only major fight of the game came midway through the third period, when Clyde Goodswimmer of the Vikings and Lorie Gail of the Vees tangled. Gail drew an extra minor penalty when he hit Goodswimmer again after getting out of the penalty box.

Vernon deluged the Pentiction net with 56 shots, while the Vees managed 24 shots on goal.

Pentiction had nine of 17 minors and each team had a major.

Pentiction currently has 19 points, while Merritt has 16.

In Merritt, Kelowna led 3-1 after one period and 6-2 after two.

Phil Logan and Brad Owens paced Kelowna with two goals each. Wayne Krebs, Ken Calder, Bill Audycki and Pat Severyn each scored once.

Beaman, Bob Wasson, and Kirk Aulin scored for Merritt.

Kelowna outshot Merritt 37-31. Merritt took 12 of 22 minor penalties. Each team had four fighting majors and Merritt drew two of three 10-minute misconducts. Kelowna had a game misconduct.

In Chilliwack, Terry Tarnow's goal in sudden-death overtime gave Nanaimo the win and strengthened the Clippers' grasp on first place in the Coast division. Nanaimo has 28 points, three ahead of Langley Lords, while Chilliwack is entrenched in last place with eight points.

Mickey Willgress, Gord Geneurex, Gary Lupal, and Brent Kristoff were the other Nanaimo scorers while Randy Irving led Chilliwack with two goals. Tim Hollett and Al Cunningham added singles.

Chilliwack led 3-0 at the end of the first but Nanaimo stormed back to trail 4-3 by the end of the second before forcing overtime.

Chilliwack outshot Nanaimo 38-29. Each team had two fighting majors and Nanaimo had a misconduct.

Next games are set for Friday when Vernon is at Langley, Chilliwack is at Kelowna, Merritt visits Pentiction, and Maple Ridge is host to Nanaimo.
