

McNab pops in three, takes Bruins to victory

Big Peter McNab laughed when asked what he planned to do with the puck he retrieved after scoring three goals in a game for the first time in his National Hockey League career.

"I'll give it to my dog, I guess, and then chew it up," the six-foot-three centre said Thursday night after leading Boston Bruins to a 3-0 victory over Chicago Black Hawks. "Maybe if I give it to them they won't chew up anything else."

McNab, son of Washington Capitals general manager Max McNab, appears to have found a home in Boston since a deal of free agents which sent Andre Savard to Buffalo Sabres.

In just 13 games, McNab has scored 12 goals and collected five assists, helping the Bruins to a 10-3 record and a nine-point lead in the Adams Division.

In the only other game played Thursday, Detroit Red Wings beat Philadelphia Flyers 2-2.

VISIT CLEVELAND

The Flyers have a chance to resume their winning ways tonight against the Barons at Cleveland. Toronto Maple Leafs are at Atlanta Flames, Buffalo at Washington, Pittsburgh Penguins at Colorado Rockies and Los Angeles Kings at Vancouver Canucks.

McNab, who was the American Hockey League's most valuable player in 1974 after earning all-America

honors at Denver University, admitted he may have been too defensive-minded at the start of the season.

"I know... this team had a tremendous season last year," he said. "I didn't want to be the cause of the team going downhill. I'm still learning the technique of when to go in and

WATSON SUSPENDED

The Red Wings played without defenseman Bryan Watson, who was suspended earlier in the day for 10 games by NHL president Clarence Campbell for breaking the jaw of Chicago's Keith Magnuson's last Saturday at Olympia.

Watson, who sat out Sunday's game in New York, won't return to action until Nov. 24.

The decision followed a hearing in Detroit on Wednesday to review game films. Watson clobbered Magnuson full tilt from the blind side, hitting him with both fists and possibly his stick.

Detroit jumped out to a 2-0 lead after two periods as Nick Libert and Danny Maloney beat Bernie Fano on power play goals.

The Broad Street Bullies began to make a game of it early in the final period. A goal by Gary Dornhoefer at 7:28 made it 2-1.

But Detroit's Buster Harvey scored what proved to be the winner less than two minutes later, then the Red Wings held on and prayed Giacomini could withstand the onslaught.

Except for a Mel Brisman goal at 12:29, Giacomini was up to the task.

Wheat Kings drop Portland at home

PORTLAND, Ore. (CP)—Brandon Wheat Kings hit four goals in the third period to overcome a 2-1 deficit en route to a 5-2 Western Canada Hockey League victory over Portland Winter Hawks Thursday night.

The loss was Portland's first in nine home-ice outings this season.

Brian Frogg tied the count 2-2 for the Wheat Kings at 6:30 of the third period, then Ray Allison, Dan Bonar and Brett Vincent tallied in the space of 1:41 midway through the period to decide the outcome.

George Bust scored a powerplay goal to give the Winter Hawks the lead early in the first period, but Dave Semenko tied the score later in the period. Wayne Babych, who has scored 14 points for Portland in his last four games, gave Portland its last lead late in the second period.

Brandon goaltender Glen Hanlon was superlative, stopping 31 shots in the first two periods before getting off

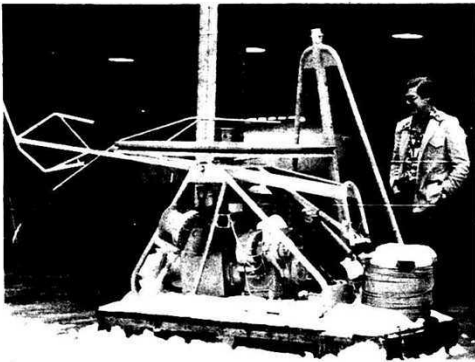
ensive help from his teammates. He finished with 38 saves as the Wheat Kings raised their season record to 16-3-2.
