Roughriders out in front after Stampeders triumph

Saskatchewan Roughriders needed a last-play touchdown Sunday afternoon to win first place in the Western Football Conference and Ron Lancaster, as usual, provided it.
The veteran quarterback threw a three-yard scoring pass to Rhett Dawson with time elapsed in the fourth quarter for a 33-31 triumph over Calgary Stampeders, who led 24-0 in the second quarter before Lancaster got his offense unbound.

The Bombers finished with 10 wins and six losses after winning only one of their first five games.
Only 4,469 fans, the smallest crowd in two years, watched the grim Winnipeg struggle at Empire Stadium in Vancouver while a crowd of 27,188 watched Lancaster's brilliant last-half demonstration.

The final game meant little to either B.C. or Calgary but both took first-quarter leads and gave the playoff teams all they could handle. Winnipeg was down 10-0 in the first quarter.
The Roughriders scored their last two touchdowns despite the loss of wingback Tom Campna and defensive back Paul Williams. Campna's injury was diagnosed as either a fractured ankle or pulled ligaments, likely to keep him out for the season, while Williams sprang his ankle and should be fit for the final.

BOMB STRIKES
Lancaster started the Roughriders rally with a 72-yard touchdown pass to Steve Sturt. He also threw 37 yards for a touchdown by Les Peterson. Molly McGeer ran four yards for the other touchdown and Cyril McCall had 15 points on three field goals, a single and three converts.

Medicine Hat, last in the Central Division, dropped a 7-4 game Saturday to Victoria Cougars, and were blown out of the rink, 9-1, by New Westminster Bruins on Sunday.

Victoria now leads the Western Division with 20 points. New Westminster, with 18, and Kamloops are tied for eighth.
Ken MacNaught and Ken Federko also scored for Saskatchewan while Dirk Graham scored Regina's first goal.
Goalie Pat Ansell of Regina made 24 saves. Saskatchewan's Dave Parro stopped 23 shots.
Regina took seven of 11 minor penalties in the clean-play game.
