VANCOUVER (CP) - Canadian World Cup Soccer team officials got nowhere Friday in attempts to solve their deadlock with the United States over a site for the vital play-off game between the two countries.

If there is no agreement, the time and place for the game will be resolved by FIFA, soccer's international headquarters in Zurich.

FIFA gave the two countries 10 days to make game arrangements - by World Cup rule in a neutral site before Dec. 31 - but lengthy telephone negotiations between the two sides produced no results. The 10-day period runs out this weekend.

Meanwhile, the U.S. team under coach Walt Chyzowski is currently in Haiti playing World Cup qualifiers against the Haitian national team.
