Jackson released by Toronto Argos

TORONTO (CP) - It's taken Toronto Argonauts majority owner Bill Hodgson just 12 days to rid the Canadian Football League team of what many observers called an impossible situation.

A season-long disagreement between head coach Russ Jackson and high-priced running back Anthony Davis appeared to have a good deal to do with the team's miserable 1-6 showing.

Davis, who signed a five-year, \$1-million contract, explained he was not being used enough. Jackson, a 100,000-a-year man, said Davis didn't have the desire to play solid football.

Neither of them will be around next year to continue the squabble.

On Monday, Davis bought the remainder of his contract from the Argos and has since signed with Tampa Bay Buccaneers of the National Football League, where he will begin play next season.

And on Thursday, general manager Dick Shatto announced Jackson would not return as head coach for the 1977 season. The announcement came following a two-day meeting involving Shatto, Hodgson and Jackson. Shatto said he would be responsible for football operations as well as his former duties.

Shatto's position as general manager represents another change by Hodgson. Earlier this week, Hodgson made Shatto, formerly business and marketing director, responsible for football operations as well as his former duties.

Shatto said Thursday that J.I. Albrecht, formerly manager of football operations, now would be known as director of player personnel, primarily responsible for scouting.

It was on Albrecht's urging that the Argos signed Davis. And Albrecht had 140 players in training camp this season, a situation which many rookies said didn't give them a fair shot at making the team.

The Argos, with Albrecht the ultimate scapegoat, were frustrated as many of the training camp cuts found full-time jobs with other CFL clubs.

Bruins continue their winning ways in NHL

 Boston Garden isn't as full - it used to be that has affected the play of its resident National Hockey League team.

The Bruins, playing without top attraction Bobby Orr, are undefeated in nine home games this season. Their latest win was a 3-2 decision Thursday night over Washington Capitals.

Only 9,846 fans were at the Garden for the game, almost 5,000 below capacity.

Attendance has been down at the Garden this season because of Boston management's decision to let Orr play at his option and sign as a free agent with Chicago Black Hawks. Although Orr's knee has been giving him problems, Boston fans see his departure as a personal insult to the years they supported the star.

In the only other NHL game Thursday night, New York Islanders beat Los Angeles Kings 3-1.

Association games, Calgary Cowboys edged Phoenix Roadrunners 2-1 and Quebec Nordiques dunned Minnesota Fighting Saints 9-1.

Brad Park picked up a rebound off the boards and scored on Washington goaltender Ron Low at 19:34 of the second period to put the Bruins ahead 2-1.

Defenceman Dallas Smith scored the first Bruins goal after 11 seconds of the second period.

 Washington's Guy Charlton tied it 1-1 moments later when he took a slapshot from the blue line and Boston netminder Gilbert Gilbert with a 25-footer. Vlad Kozak scored what proved to be the game-winning goal midway through the third period before Ace Bailey came back for the Capitals with five minutes left to play.

Rilly Harris scored two goals to lead the Islanders to victory, extending their unbeaten streak to nine games while the Kings winless string reached seven games, their longest in two seasons.

Islander goaltender Glenn Reach, who has the best goal-against average in the NHL, stopped the Kings on several excellent scoring opportunities in the first and third periods.

Lynn Fowle stole a pass and broke in to score with four seconds left in sudden-death overtime.

Canucks reduce roster
 VANCOUVER (CP) - Vancouver Canucks reduced their National Hockey League roster to 19 Thursday by sending forward Brad Gossford and defenceman Bob Murray to Tulsa Oilers of the Central Hockey League.

Gossford played four games for the Canucks, scoring one goal and assisting on two others. He was sent to Tulsa earlier in the season after recovering from a knee operation.

Murray played 12 NHL games this season without choice in 1976 and won the CHL rookie of the year award last season when he scored 68 goals in 68 games as Tulsa won the league championship.

The Canucks have lost their last five games and tonight play the Islanders here.
