## Fly champ defends title

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Miguel Cantu used his left hook to full advantage Friday night to defend his flyweight boxing title in a 15-round victory over Orlando Juveros of the Philippines.

Cantu, 112 pounds of Yucatan, lost only one round on exact scoring cards as he outpointed his 112-pound foe from Cagayan de Oro at the Los Angeles Sports Arena before a crowd of 12,000.

The rounds were close, but Cantu's strength proved decisive all the way, as he made six successful defensive blocks.

Referee Larry Rozadilla scored the fight 149-137, judge George Latta had 114-138, as did judge Rudy Jurda.

Neither boxer was cut, although Cantu, 28, was bruised under the left eye. The 28-year-old Mexican shook up his leg in the second round with a left hook, but neither seemed in danger of a knockdown at any time.

Cantu put his record at 33-3-3, and earned \$80,000. Generally well attended fights in the Philippines. The challenger collected \$15,000 for his unsuccessful attempt to wrest the title from Cantu.
