

McLean says juniors need more from pros

NEW WESTMINSTER, B.C. (CP) — Ernie McLean, coach and part owner of New Westminster Bruins of the Western Canada Hockey League, says most junior teams continue to operate "because of pride, not money."

"I'd venture to guess there isn't a team in the WCHL that isn't losing money right now," McLean said in an interview Sunday.

McLean was commenting on an agreement reached last week between the National Hockey League and the Canadian Junior Hockey League. The C.J.H.L. comprises the WCHL, the Ontario Major Junior Hockey League and the Quebec Major Junior Hockey League.

"I'd rather see Colorado and Minnesota use the use of Barry Beck and Brad Maxwell than accept what they're offering," McLean said. "And while the contract is a bad deal, then we'll just be tied to the pros we're closing the deal with."

Beck and Maxwell were

members of McLean's Memorial Cup champions last year. They were selected in the first round of the NHL draft, Beck by Colorado Rockies and Maxwell by Minnesota North Stars. Both had signed junior contracts with the Bruins, agreements which stipulated the \$20,000 payment to the junior team when they were signed by a professional club.

McLean said C.J.H.L. teams were paying out \$1,000 for players brought up from Tier Two teams.

"I can understand why they (the pros) are willing to pay the European federations and the Sweden \$1,000 for a player transfer, then let us somebody like Beck or Jerry Gillis form the brochure, Que., junior now with Vancouver Canucks of the NHL is worth only \$7,000," added McLean.

The major juniors do not have an agreement with the World Hockey Association.

Lafleur leads the pack

MONTREAL (CP) — Guy Lafleur of Montreal Canadiens was in more familiar position Monday when the National Hockey League released statistics on the "fruit" scoring leaders and top goal scorers.

Lafleur, who led the NHL scoring parade the last two seasons but had not been at York for this year, finds himself alone leading the pack with 26 points compared with 29 for Bryan Trottier of New York Islanders.

The Montreal right winger picked up seven points last week and 14 assists. He also leads the league in the goals department with 15. Trottier came in at Toronto Maple Leafs Saturday as Lafleur became the first player this season to have two three-goal games.

Rookie Mike Bossy of the Islanders has been one of the surprises of the young NHL season. Bossy and Reg Leach of Philadelphia Flyers both have 20 points in a tie for sixth place. Bossy has 11 goals and nine assists while the once-productive Leach has seven goals and 13 assists.

In the Vesna Trophy race for the best goal-scoring average, Wayne Stephenson and Bernie Parent of Philadelphia now have the lead with a combined average of 2.07.

The Montreal duo of Michel Perreault and Ken Dryden are next at 2.13.

In the shutout department, Rogie Vachon of Los Angeles Kings, Stephenson, Dryden and Glenn Resch of the Islanders have each registered two.

Cardinals upset unbeaten Cowboys

DALLAS (AP) — St. Louis Cardinals, with 19-year veteran Jackie Smith getting his first playoff game since 1975 and quarterback Jim Hart directing the offense, surprised the unbeaten Dallas Cowboys 24-17 Monday night in the National Football League.

"I think it's obvious we've turned our season around," said Hart, who directed the Cardinals to a 24-17 victory over the Cowboys.

Smith with 3:10 to play for the winner.

The Cardinals' record dropped to 8-1 and St. Louis put some suspense back in the National Conference Eastern Division race with its fifth consecutive victory for a 6-3 man's.

Dallas, off to its best start in the 17-year history of the club, appeared to have the Cardinals well caged, building a 14-3 halftime lead on Tony Stewart's second touchdown run and a two-yard scoring pass from Roger Staubach to tight end Billy Joe DuPree.

All St. Louis had to show for the first half was Jim Hart's 10-yard touchdown pass to the Cardinals' tight end, Steve Watson.

But Dallas pulled a chance to tie the game open when Randy Hughes intercepted a Hart pass at the St. Louis 17 only to see DuPree return the favor with a fumble on an end around.

Wayne Morris scored on a one-yard touchdown run after Bernie Barnes was flagged on a 43-yard interference call and the Cardinals trailed 14-10. Steven Herrera's 21-yard field goal set the stage for Hart's fourth quarter heroics.

"We haven't played good for the last three or four weeks and a loss was inevitable," said Dallas coach Tom Landry. "The Cardinals have made things interesting again in the division particularly with us going to Pittsburgh next week."

Landry sounded like there might be some changes in store for the spatterfield offense—like rookie Tony Dorsett moving into a starting position.

St. Louis coach Don Coryell,

whose team lost 30-24 to Dallas on Oct. 9, said: "I've never been as happy about a win like I was tonight. This was a great victory. We wanted it bad."

The game was a rough-and-tumble affair with both teams having 14 penalties and Lee Nelson of the Cardinals being ejected for fighting.
